

### PLAN WATER ROUTE DETROIT-NEW YORK

#### Two Ships to Be Operated in Lakes and Canal, Is Re- port; Expect Great Success

A regular all-water freight service between Detroit and foreign ports through New York has been inaugurated by the Terminals and Transportation corporation, which is planning to operate two ships, Twin Ports and Twin Cities on a nine day schedule via the New York State Barge Canal, says a Detroit dispatch to the Christian Science Monitor. Other ships now in the course of construction will be added to this service as rapidly as required by business demands.

The route is by way of the Detroit river to Lake Erie, across Lake Erie, through Welland Canal to Lake Ontario, along Lake Ontario to Oswego, N. Y., down Oswego river and canal to Oneida lake, across Oneida lake to the Mohawk river, down the river and the New York State Canal to the Hudson river and New York City, where the goods for Europe are transferred to Atlantic liners.

#### Electric Freighter

The Diesel electric freighter, Twin Ports, with which this Detroit to New York service has been opened is powered by two 475 horsepower Diesel engines. The ship is 260 feet overall, with a 42-foot beam and a 10-foot draft, when laden. It is equipped with electric drive, light, heat and refrigeration. The steering gear is electrically operated.

The size of the ship and its refrigeration facilities, enables it to carry a wide variety of freight, ranging from dairy and food products to automotive products. Other ships to be placed in operation on this route will be built along similar lines. It is planned to have five other ships maintain a service every other day between Detroit and Duluth. Michigan manufacturers are making shipments to a number of foreign countries over the new route and are promising active support of the new undertaking.

### PROBLEMS CHANGED BY PASSING TIME

The passing of a few months, Nation's Business Magazine points out, effects surprising changes in the tempo of public discussions of national issues. Six short months ago farm relief occupied first place in political and economic thought. #### AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY OF CITY OFFICERS AND CERTAIN EMPLOYEES OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, ILLINOIS."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK: THAT AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY OF CITY OFFICERS AND CERTAIN EMPLOYEES OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, ILLINOIS" BE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the salaries of the following City Officers and employees, for the fiscal year beginning May 1st, 1927, and ending April 30th, 1928, be fixed at such sum as is provided for by this ordinance for such officer or employe for the discharge of the duties of such office, as required under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the ordinances of the City of Highland Park, during the term of his office or employment, and that such officer or employe shall receive no further compensation from the City of Highland Park for the duties of such office during the term thereof.

That the salary of the City Clerk be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Corporation Counsel be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Treasurer be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Collector be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per annum.

and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$3,400.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Assistant in the City Collector's office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$1,688.00) per annum.

That the salary of the City Marshal be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$3,200.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Sergeant Number One, Two and Three be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Three Hundred Ten Dollars (\$2,310.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Officers Number Seven and Eight be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$2,160.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Officer Number Three, Five and Six be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$2,100.00) per annum.

That the salary of Police Officers Number Seven and Eight be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$1,980.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Chief Engineer of the Water Works be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$3,200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the First, Second and Third Assistant Engineers at the Water Works be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Foreman of Streets and Public Improvements be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Chauffeur in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$1,688.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Foreman of Sewer and Water be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Stenographer in the City Clerk's office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Bookkeeper in the City Clerk's office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Stenographer in the City Collector's office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$1,320.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Chief Fire Marshal be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the First Assistant Fire Marshal in charge of the Fire Station (during the day) be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$2,700.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Second Assistant Fire Marshal in charge of the Fire Station (during the night) be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$2,160.00) per annum.

That the salary of Firemen Number One, Two and Three be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Forty Dollars (\$2,400.00) per annum.

That the salary of Fireman Number Four and Five be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the General Helper in the Water Department be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the man in charge of the Garbage Incinerator Plant be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Six Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$1,620.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Building Inspector be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Assistant in the Building Inspector's office be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$1,920.00) per annum.

That the salary of the President of the Board of Health be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Visiting Nurse be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Moving Picture Censor be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) per annum.

SECTION 2. That the salaries provided for in Section One of this ordinance shall be due and payable in semi-monthly installments on the first and fifteenth day of each month for the preceding half month of their services during the term of their office.

SECTION 3. That the salary of the City Clerk, Corporation Counsel, President of the Board of Health, City Marshal, Police Sergeant, City Police Officers, Stenographers in the City Clerk's office, Bookkeepers in the City Clerk's office and Visiting Nurse shall be paid from the Salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Public Affairs.

That the salary of the City Treasurer, City Collector, City Collector's Assistant and Stenographer in the City Collector's office shall be paid from the Salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Accounts and Finance.

That the salary of the Foreman of Sewer and Water Works, Chief Engineer of the Water Works, First, Second and Third Assistants at the Water Works, General Helper in the Water Department, Chief Fire Marshal, Day and Night Firemen at the Fire Station, Firemen Number One, Two, Three, Four and Five, Building Inspector, Assistant in the Building Department and Moving Picture Censor shall be paid from the Salary Fund provided for in the Department of Public Health and Safety.

That the salary of the Foreman of Streets and Public Improvements and the Chauffeur in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements and the Chauffeur in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements shall be paid from the Salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements.

That the salary of the man in charge of the Garbage Incinerator shall be paid from the Salary of Officers Fund provided for in the Department of Streets and Public Improvements.

SECTION 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. This ordinance as hereby amended shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.
