More than one hundred persons were present, many of whom expressed their satisfaction that the school was well worth while. Seventy-seven children had registered during the four weeks and the average attendance was forty-five. Seventeen attended every day the school was held, many other would have had a perfect record had they not gone on vacations. Beside the demonstration of class work that evidenced what the children had learned the hand-work of the children was on display. The older girls made about eighty garments for children of India. The older boys made a Noah's Ark with some fifty animals cut out in wood, the same being artistically painted by five or six girls. This outfit is to be given to a boys orphanage or possibly to a foreign missionary. The smaller children made books in church shape illustrating the life of Christ with cut out pictures and Scripture portions from penny Gospels pasted in the books. These are to be distributed to hospitals where sick children may have access to them. Other projects were carried out by the smallest children. These things are still on display at the church and may be seen by any who might be interested.

#### MUNICIPAL PLANTS FAILURE, ARE SOLD

Many Transferred to Private Ownership In Past Year, Report Says

Figures compiled by the National Electric Light association show that 105 municipal power plants passed from municipal to private ownership in 1926 and 269 were transferred in 1925.

A recent survey made by the United States Census Bureau reveals the fact that privately-owned companies supply 95.1 per cent of the electrical energy produced in this country and that municipally-owned plants supply the remaining 4.9 per cent.

Though producing less than five per cent of the total energy consumed by the nation every year, those municipal plants required 10.3 per cent of the total amount of fuel used in generating electric power.
