**PLAN TO UTILIZE SKOKIE AS AIRPORT**  
Glencoe Man Reported to Have Suggested Its Use For Landing Field

A plan to convert the Skokie valley, which extends from Lake county down into Cook county into a monster airport is being fostered by Henry C. Burnett, of Glencoe, and he will present the matter to the Chambers of Commerce in Glencoe, Highland Park, Waukegan and other North Shore cities within the near future, according to a report in the Waukegan Sun. This would give Waukegan a vast airport near its borders.

The plan provides for the draining and deforesting of the tract which is now nothing more than a vast marsh.

"The valley, eight miles long and a mile wide, is an ideal location for an airport," Mr. Burnett is quoted as saying. "There is splendid transportation to Chicago over the Northwestern and the electric lines. To reclaim it would not present much of an engineering problem.

"Ample facilities could be provided there for hangers and for repair stations for mail and passenger planes alike."

The work would be undertaken, Mr. Burnett believes, by the government or a number of prominent business men. Ownership of the valley lies partly in the village of Glencoe, Cook county, and much of it is privately owned.

It was also learned that the village board of St. Charles this week considered plans for the construction of an airport there.

**GLENCOE MAN SEES KILAUEA VOLCANO**

A spectacular return of molten lava to the fire pit of Kilauea volcano seemed to be arranged for the special benefit of Oliver Picher of Glencoe, Ill., and his fellow travelers who arrived at Honolulu July 8 on the S. S. City of Honolulu.

The activity which began the night before is the first in three years and is attracting such crowds of spectators that the boats plying between Honolulu and the island of Hawaii where the volcano is located are booked to capacity. Beautiful fountains of red lava are playing the pit Halemaumau and visitors are watching the weird show by day and night. The Hawaiians are throwing ohelo berries and other offerings into the pit in recognition of Pele, the goddess of the volcano.
