**CITIES YIVING FOR G. O. P. CONVENTION**

**East and West Seek It; Not Much Competition for Democratic Session**

The battle among American cities for the Republican National convention in 1928 is still going on apace. Crocker of California, bearing aloft the San Francisco banner, has made the most systematic campaign. Before he left the east, he told his friends that he had already secured a majority of the Republican National committee, and that the states of Washington, Oregon, Utah and Colorado favored the Golden Gate. Detroiters are also showing considerable vim. Governor Green has already made one visit to Washington at the head of a delegation which urged the claims of that city, and a new delegation is in the making. Carmi Thompson between times has been urging Cleveland. It was largely through his activities that the Republicans went there in 1924, and Mr. Thompson's argument is that one good turn deserves another.

Boston has retired from the list of applicants for the Republican convention, but there are indications that the Democrats are seriously considering the city with the idea—a foolish one it would seem—of hitting Coolidge at the source. Omaha, Kansas City, St. Louis, Chicago and Minneapolis are also in the running, the Kansas City boom being apparently the most substantial. It may be only a sign of the times, but it is worth noting that the competition is mainly for the Republican gathering. The Democratic convention apparently is going to be of the Orphan Annie variety. The actual selection of the Republican convention city will not be made before December next at the meeting of the Republican National committee.
