language is likewise native, will appear opposite her as the faithless young lover.

"Madame Butterfly" Giovanni Martinelli will appear for the first time this season as Pinkerton in "Madame Butterfly" when this opera is presented on Thursday night, with Elisabeth Rethberg in the title role.

Madame Bori, Mr. Martinelli and Mr. Danise will form the trio of leading characters in "Manon Lescaut" when that opera is given again on Saturday night, and Madame Gall will repeat her success as Thais by singing that role for the second time on Wednesday night.

Sunday Afternoon The week will formally begin Sunday afternoon with another special feature—"An Afternoon of French Music"—during which, in addition to the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Eric DeLamarter, La Chorale Francaise de Chicago, will be heard in a splendid program of French choral singing.

"La Boheme" Sunday Eve There is no opera in the modern Italian repertoire that makes broader appeal than does Puccini's "La Boheme." When it is given on Sunday night, August 14, it will have added interest as Miss Mary Lewis will sing the part of Mimi for the first time this season.

Another extra performance has been scheduled for Monday night, August 15, when "Tosca," which is also by Puccini, is being presented in place of the concert which ordinarily forms the Monday night attraction. At this time Madame Yvonne Gall will sing the title role, which it is said is one of the greatest parts of her extensive repertoire.

"La Vida Breve," that colorful and dramatic Spanish opera which was added to the Ravinia repertoire last season, and which proved to be a breath-taking vehicle for Madame Lucrezia Bori, is scheduled for Tuesday night, August 16. This celebrated Spanish soprano will again be vis-a-vis with Jose Mojica, who is likewise Spanish, and in view of the fact that the libretto is in the Castilian tongue the work will be replete in the atmosphere of old Spain.

So instantaneous was the success made by Yvonne Gall as Thais on the occasion of her Ravinia debut that an early repetition of this great Massenet work has become imperative. Therefore it will be presented again on Wednesday night, Aug. 17, when those who were unable to obtain seats for Madame Gall's debut will

have the opportunity of hearing her in this dramatic role. The entire cast will be the same as that of last Monday night, Giuseppe Danise singing the part of Athanael, which Ravinia patrons now realize is one of his most telling characterizations. Jose Mojica will be heard as Niclas, in which part his beautiful lyric voice shows to splendid advantage.

The Children's concert and entertainment on Thursday afternoon will be replete in special features. The concert will, as usual, be given by the Chicago Symphony orchestra, Eric DeLamarter conducting and explaining the numbers to the children.

"Madame Butterfly," which ranks high among the list of Ravinia favorites, will be presented on Thursday night, Aug. 18, with an important change of cast, Giovanni Martinelli appearing for the first time this season as Lt. Pinkerton. Mr. Martinelli has sung this role in seasons past at Ravinia, scoring tremendous success as the American Naval Officer.

"The Tales of Hoffman," that unusual French opera in which the fantastic note is emphasized, will be repeated on Friday night, Aug. 19, Miss Mary Lewis again being heard as Giulietta, a role which she sings and ornaments to splendid advantage.

Puccini's "Manon Lescaut," the Italian version of the famous Manon story, will be given a repeat performance on Saturday night, as this opera is one of the most popular of the repertoire. Lucrezia Bori will have the title role, in which both her singing and acting have won her the unstinted praise of her legion of admirers.

PUBLIC SERVICE CO. REPORT FOR QUARTER

Operating revenues of \$6,191,570.93 for the quarter-year ending June 30, is announced by the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois in a statement issued this week at the company's general offices in Chicago. Tax charges, interest and retirement deductions leave a net income for the

quarter of \$1,099,951.90, according to the statement.

Figuring on the basis of the year which ended June 30, the total operating revenues are shown in the statement to be \$24,568,175.74. Deductions from this amount for taxes, interest and other charges, leave a net income for the year ending June 30, of \$4,601,698.76.

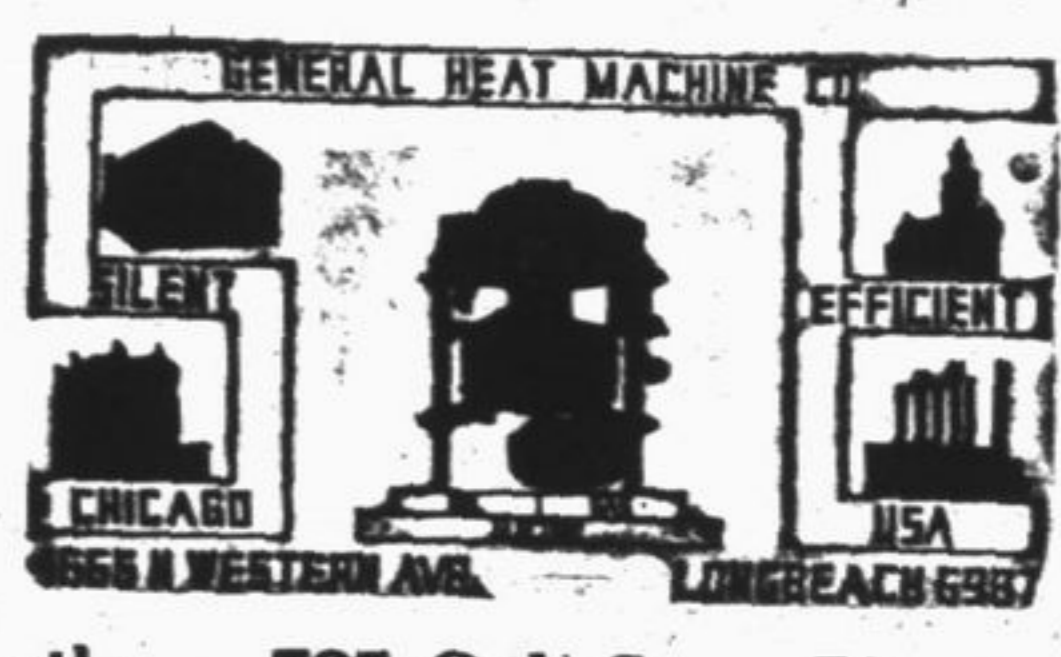
