CENSORSHIP LIFTED ON PICTURE HERE

"Night of Love" To Be Shown at Alcyon Thursday, Friday and Saturday

Highland Park had its first censorship squabble when the picture "A Night of Love" starring Ronald Colman and Vilma Banky was rejected by the local censor. The story is thus told by Manager Godshaw of the Alcyon theatre.

Realizing the merit of the picture, the superb acting, direction and photography, the Alcyon Theatre management insisted that the picture was not as startling as it was rated and further insisted on a permit and asserted they would ask for a court ruling. This is the same picture that was opposed by the Chicago Board of Censors but was shown nevertheless on an appeal to the courts and an injunction secured by the McVickers Theatre restraining the city from interfering with the exhibition.

The Highland Park censor conceded that it was a remarkable picture and one the public could enjoy with modifications and she would recommend a permit if others were called in for their opinions. The Alcyon

management arranged for an afternoon screening of the picture which was attended by the censor, Chief of Police Moroney, Mrs. Everett Millard and Mrs. E. Currie.

It was finally decided that the picture could be shown with the exception of two scenes lasting about a half a minute each of a closeup of a dancer which was construed as irrelevant to the plot and easily omitted. This scene was ordered reduced to a flash. Other changes in a title and a modification of a banquet scene were ordered made.

So on this proviso Highland Park's first censorship squabble ended and Chief Moroney issued a "pink per-

mit" which means the picture can be shown but to adults only. While the dissenation was on the picture, which was a good seller, was rapidly being bought up by exhibitors in Chicago and when the Alcyon applied for exhibition dates the only dates available before next month were Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week. So a special show will be presented at the matinee Saturday for the children starting at 1:45 and ending at 3:45 comprising other features interesting for the children. The Saturday afternoon showing of "A Night of Love" starts at 3:45. Children must leave the theatre before this show commences.
