

CHILD IS VICTIM IN AUTO ACCIDENT

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Rushed to Hospital
Sheik helped place the child in Roslund's car and the latter and the little girl's father accompanied her to the hospital, where she died in about 45 minutes. The accident happened about 8:30 Monday morning.

The jury which sat in the inquest was composed of Fred Rudolph, foreman; Fred Botker, William Hennig, Charles Donner, William Kelly and E. R. Ohlwein. They were much affected by the tragic death of the little girl and carefully investigated all the circumstances eventually coming to the conclusion that the driver of the car which struck her was not to blame and accordingly exonerated him in the verdict.

Sympathy Expressed

The death of the child spread a pall of gloom throughout the neighborhood, where she was well known and a general favorite, and the deep sympathy of their many friends and the community in general is extended to the parents in their sad and sudden bereavement. Dorothy was born March 29, 1921, in Chicago and was aged six years, four months and 10 days.

The funeral was held at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, at the H. M. Prior company's chapel, and burial was in Rosehill cemetery.

Death of Infant

Jesse Herbert Beckham, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Beckham of Burlington, Wis., visiting at the home of the child's grandmother, Mrs. Carlson, 141 North avenue, Highwood, died there Saturday after a brief illness. He was aged four months and eight days. The funeral was held Tuesday morning at the H. M. Prior Co. chapel, and burial was in Memorial Park cemetery.

Dies in Hospital

William W. Martin of Chicago, a patient for two weeks in the Highland Park hospital, died there Friday, aged 67 years. He had never resided in this city, but was a valued employe of the Adams-Westlake Co. in Chicago. His wife survives. The funeral was held Monday and burial was at Rosehill.

Death at Fort

Corporal Novie Moss, in the regular army service for 20 years and about four years at Fort Sheridan, died there August 4, of chronic nephritis. He was 45 years of age and a member of the Second Field Artillery. His wife survives. A military funeral was held Monday, and the body was taken to Franklin, Ky., for interment.

The report of Building Inspector S. D. Morris was also ordered filed. Its contents were published last week.

On motion of Commissioner Gourelly the Volunteers of America were granted a permit for a tag day here, the date to be determined later.

The street department was authorized, on motion of Commissioner Gourelly, to remove from city parkways all advertising signs which have not been constructed under permits from the city council.

The corporation counsel was instructed to report to the council with reference to the responsibility for repairs to the sanitary sewer in the ravine east of the South Sheridan road bridge.

More Water Mains

The council took a recess and convened as the Board of Local Improvements, and after the board meeting the board submitted an ordinance providing for construction of a connected system of cast iron water mains in Clavey road, Ellridge circle, Sumac road, Eastview road and Rosemary road, including all labor and materials and other necessary expenses, together with estimate of cost, etc., and recommended its passage and the making of the improvement as outlined.

On motion of Commissioner Gourelly the ordinance as read was placed on file with the city clerk for public inspection.

The communication of A. F. Durand with reference to construction of sidewalks on Sheridan road was referred to the Department of Streets and Public Improvements.

The communication of W. E. Becker requesting permission to install an additional gasoline pump in the parkway in front of his garage at 15 North St. Johns avenue was referred to the Department of Public Affairs.

The communication of M. K. Tillman with reference to material yards at West Park avenue and the North Shore railroad right of way was referred to the corporation counsel with instructions to take whatever action he deems necessary and report back to the council at next meeting.

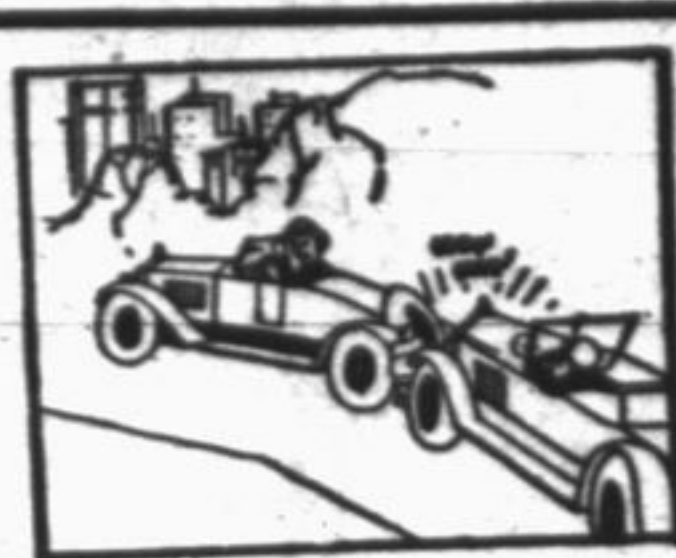
