LARGELY ATTENDED**

The scheduled speakers were missed. Following a good sized parade in the forenoon the field events and a thrilling ball game between Northbrook and Deerfield teams, with a band concert kept things going along most of the afternoon. The Hubert brothers boxing exhibition was the closing feature and did not fail to win the crowd. The five rounds of boxing by these boys proved to be a clever attraction. The referee, J. McLachlan declared the contest a draw.

The Civic association aims to have each successive annual celebration a better and more interesting affair, and will in the near future begin plans for added features for 1928.

**Flower Booth Attracts Many**

Ever since the red, zinnia was adopted last spring as the official Northbrook flower there has been wide interest in the growing of the community flower. This interest was brought to a climax last Saturday when magnificent specimens of the Scarlet Flame Zinnia were brought to the flower booth in the grove and entered in the contest for prizes.

The following prizes were awarded by the Civic association on Northbrook day, immediately following the parade.

The prize of \$5 for the best growing bed of zinnias was won by Mrs. J. F. Rosenow. Mrs. Arthur Therrien won the prize of \$3 for the second best bed of zinnias. The bed of Edgar Wessling was accorded honorable mention by the judges.

The \$3 prize offered for the best bunch of four or more cut zinnias was won by Mrs. Adam Webber, Mrs. Emma Grohs winning the prize of \$2 for the second best bunch of four.

There was keen competition for the prize of \$2 awarded for the best one zinnia exhibited. This prize went to Wilma Boeye. Close competitors were E. D. Landwehr, grower of the second best, Mrs. C. B. Kiest, the third best, and Harold Mentzer, the fourth best.

The zinnia display was one of the popular features of the Northbrook Day celebration, and it is believed that next year the feature can be greatly enlarged.
