**PREHISTORIC MAN
IN AMERICA TRACED**
FOUR GREAT CULTURES

Expedition into Canyons of Colorado Finds Interesting Remains of Forgotten Inhabitants

The search for the footprints of Early Man is being carried on by indefatigable groups from various museums and universities throughout the world—the lead easily being taken by the groups from the United States. Many different countries are being searched and numerous sites are being excavated, notably in Asia Minor, where, near Kih, the University of Chicago has an expedition making priceless discoveries. The Field Museum also has many expeditions out in widely separated sections of the globe, one very important one having just returned from Abyssinia. Other expeditions are in South America, Alaska, China, Central America, and Mexico.

A communication just received by Frank G. Logan, Hon. Vice-President of the Art Institute gives an account of an expedition into the mysterious canyons of the Mesa Verde National Park in Southwestern Colorado, headed by a young explorer, Richard Haga. This expedition unearthed many interesting and unique pieces of pottery, the work of artists of a race much earlier than the Aztecs.

Four Great Cultures

There are four great cultures to be traced in our Western States, the first and oldest being the Basketmaker. They lived some four thousand years ago in Arizona and Utah and their habitations were usually beneath great sandstone cliffs, where they stored their grain in hollows dug in the caves, which were crudely covered over to keep the animals out. This race of early Americans did not know the use of pottery. They made baskets of grass and did their cooking by placing their food in the baskets and dropping hot stones inside. This, the earliest race so far discovered in America, was succeeded by a people called the Post Basketmakers, who lived about three thousand years ago in Arizona and Utah have been found in the Mesa Verde district. This race knew the use of pottery, which their artists decorated with crude black and white symbols, the different pigments of roots and rocks being used for coloring.

The third culture, that which succeeded the Post Basketmakers, is called the Pre-Pueblo, or the Pit House people. On this race little is known for they became so numerous that they left the protection of the caves and dwelt on the open mesa, hence the weathering of their habitations has gone on so that little or nothing is left of them. However, they improved upon their predecessor in the making of pottery, the composition and decoration being much superior. The Pit House people seem to have vanished about the commencement of the Christian Era and were followed by the Cliff Dwellers, the most interesting and most civilized of all the four great cultures. Ruins left by this race are the wonder of the archaeologist, one great palace alone, in the Mesa Verde Park, having over two hundred rooms and twenty-three Kivas (religious chambers) and it is estimated that upwards of seven hundred people lived in it at one time. This race was deeply religious and was a peaceful, agricultural people, and although it disappeared as recently as six hundred years ago, its manner of disappearance has never been definitely determined. The most generally accepted theory is that, owing to a prolonged drought they were forced to migrate, with the intention of returning, but that they were set upon and slaughtered by warlike plains Indians.

Rare Pottery Found

In making excavations in the Park, Mr. Hagar and his companions found, besides many rare specimens of pottery, two skeletons, one of a grown man and the other the mummy of a baby in a perfect state of preservation. The skin had dried on the bones and even the hair remained on the head, and the wrappings were in excellent condition. While the Egyptians used artificial means to mummify their dead, the Indians of the Southwest did not, the dry climate being sufficient to preserve the bodies perfectly. In gallery 31, Gunsaulus Hall, in the Art Institute a case of pottery containing many fine examples of prehistoric American pottery may be seen, the gift of James H. Elworth.

**PROBE SECRETS OF
MISSION FATHERS**
Group of Tourists Visit Old Spanish Missions and See Many Notable Things; Old Legends

Secrets of the old Spanish Mission Fathers, locked for years within forgotten graves, were rediscovered by a party of investigators on a recent pilgrimage to the ancient missions of San Carlos Borromeo, better known as Carmel Mission, and the Mission San Antonio de Padua, in California.

The expedition, which was sponsored by the Reo Motor Car company of California, in connection with the Los Angeles "Evening Express," set out with the purpose of penetrating the veil of mystery and legend which surrounds the old Mission structures.

Story of Starvation

Poring over dusty manuscripts preserved in the Mission ruins, the Reo party unearthed an absorbing account of a struggle against starvation by the Fathers of Carmel Mission in 1771. The only means of getting supplies to the Mission was by boat, it was found, and the boats had failed to arrive that year. The Fathers, slowly starving, struggled on as best they could, but finally had to throw themselves on the charity of the Indians they were attempting to convert. Their kind treatment of the Indians since the establishment of the Mission was rewarded in this emergency, for they were enabled to keep alive by means of the food brought to them by their redmen friends. The ruins that are seen today are preserved through the activities of Rev. Angelo Cassanova, who in 1868 cleared away the debris, discovering the graves of the early Mission Fathers.

Tale of Poisoned Food

A story less cheerful was unearthed at the Mission San Antonio de Padua by the Reo investigators. This Mission, founded in 1771, was at one time so powerful that it boasted 1067 neophytes and a total population of 1296. The desire for the fine horses owned at the Mission was too great for many of the Indians to resist, and frequent thefts occurred. Punishment for these offenses was promptly meted out when the guilty persons could be caught, and this brought about an unfriendly feeling between certain of the Indians and the Mission Fathers. Three of the Padres who were in charge of the outpost died under circumstances that indicated they had partaken of poisoned food, and the unfriendly Indians were blamed. The graves of these Padres were found to be covered with weeds, and without even a headstone.

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THIS STATE

Swept by the lake breezes on the exterior, and its interior of cool marble, efficiently ventilated, the temperature in this temple of the sciences never exceeds 70 degrees, museum officials announced today in issuing an invitation to all who suffer from the heat to seek refuge within its walls.

The moment one enters the portals of Stanley Field hall, into which the main entrance opens, he is struck by the refreshing atmosphere of the building, and many visitors have commented on the great relief from the heat the museum affords.

The building looks cool and is cool. To add to the psychological effect, the visitor may feast his eyes on exhibits of Eskimos, polar bears in their native settings, and other collections brought from the Arctic regions. On the other hand he may enjoy the collections from Africa and others of the hottest places in the world in the greatest comfort.

The museum is open free to adults on Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays, and is free to children, students and teachers at all times.
