

#### Crash; Rumor of Death Circulated

As Al Kimmings, of 1915 S. Sheridan road, walked from the Highland Park hospital last Friday he heard the report that he died from injuries sustained last Thursday evening in Highland Park in an automobile acci-

These reports had been circulated by friends who had heard that Kimmings had died and were going about spreading the word, incidentally remarking that Kimmings "was an awful good fellow and that it was too had that he had to lose his life."

The police reported that Kimmings, a milk wagon driver for the Bowman Dairy Co., was struck by a car driven by Joe Arauano, of Highwood, on St. Johns avenue. Aurano failed to stop for a stop sign, it was reported.

Kimmings was rushed to the hospital where x-ray pictures were taken. Although it had been feared there were injuries to the spine the x-rays disclosed nothing wrong.

He suffered numerous bruises.
