CHILDREN APPEAR IN OUT OF DOOR PLAY

Miss Mary Page Presents Class In Fantastic Performance August 10

The summer occupation of a group of children under the direction of Miss Mary Page, has been the production of a drama construction accompanied instruction in "Told in a Chinese Garden," the author of which is Constance Grenelle Wilcox.

This little fantastic play for out of doors was produced in the lovely garden in front of the home of the Page family in Brierhill on Wednesday morning, Aug. 10, at eleven o'clock. It was quite a brilliant little pageant, with authentic Chinese costumes, which, with the natural setting of part of "the forest primeval" that still exists on the former estate of the Muhke family, made the performance a dream-like affair.

An artificial gold fish pool had been manufactured in the center of the lawn, and a rustic bridge in the background. In the pool, in which was real water in a canvas covered frame, about 10 feet square, an image squatted, border of salpiglossis, snap dragon, argeratum, forget-me-nots, baby's breath, and orange and scarlet zinnias surrounded the pond. A spectacular orange and black pagoda was to the left and to the right a huge wooden vase the shape of an inverted pyramid. An accidental note was in the spire of St. Paul's church in the background. Its distance made it appear as a slender finger pointed toward the sky. A solitary lightning scarred trunk of an old tree has been allowed to remain because it houses a wood pecker's nest, beside the lawn.

The Page house is a Colonial one, and the guests sat on the wide veranda and viewed the gorgeous spectacle between the tall two story pillars. On the broad acres of the Briergate Golf club women players in their bright costumes, paused to listen to the well trained voices of the children whose lines could be heard for considerable distance.
