A TRIBUTE TO America's Great Citizen and Peerless Industrial Leader Judge Elbert H. Gary

As one who knew, admired and respected Judge Gary, and mourns his loss, I attended his funeral which was held at Wheaton, Illinois, on August 18th, 1927.

As one who was privileged to be numbered among this group, I was most profoundly impressed with the great influence of the exemplary life and wonderful achievements of the famous American who had passed on.

He spoke with spiritual feeling of his friend, the great leader, whose birthright and birthplace, like that of the great emancipator Abraham Lincoln, and other famous Americans, comprised "Son of countryside parents and environment of American farm life."

The pastor had known Judge Gary intimately for many years, and as one of his spiritual advisors, was privileged to know his principles and characteristics.

His reference to the precepts which guided and influenced Judge Gary's life, included justice, fairness and honesty, but particularly sobriety of thought and deed.

In the career of Elbert H. Gary, based as it was on staunchness of character, and wisdom of experience, we have another outstanding example of the greatness of many prominent Americans whose heritage consisted chiefly of the guidance of honest, frugal parents, and the influence of early American-country life.

This country boy achieved the distinction not only of the most successful leadership of one of the world's greatest industries, but in addition, his same life, democracy and kindly nature brought him countless friends, unusual longevity, and great fortune.

Few servants of his fellow men have ever achieved more than Judge Gary. His name and career will endure for time without end.

RUN MOTOR COACHES TO MILWAUKEE NOW

Regular daily motor coach service between the Chicago Loop and downtown Milwaukee was inaugurated Saturday, Aug. 20, by the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee railroad—the North Shore Line.

Parlor-observation coaches are being used in this new interstate service, to which regular rail ticket rates apply. Connection in either direction with North Shore Line trains is made at Wilson avenue and Dempster street, Niles Center, with transfer privileges at these stations.

This new limited service is the fastest motor coach schedule ever instituted between Chicago and Milwaukee. Coaches leave the Auditorium Hotel, Congress street and Michigan boulevard, northbound daily at 8:20 a. m., and 2:20 p. m., standard time, arriving at Milwaukee Terminal at 12 o'clock noon and 6 p. m., respectively.

Southbound coaches leave Milwaukee Terminal at 8:30 a. m. and 2:30 p. m., standard time, arriving at 223 South Wabash avenue in the Chicago Loop at 12 o'clock noon and 6 p. m. respectively.

The coaches operate on Sheridan road between the Loop and Wilson avenue, and along Ashland and McCormick boulevards between Wilson avenue and Dempster street. The route between Dempster street and Milwaukee is along Waukegan road through the scenic Skokie valley, on what is officially U. S. Route No. 41.
