This carnival has been an annual event since 1919 when a group of Ravinia residents conceived the idea from a celebration held each year by the residents of Provincetown, Rhode Island, which they called the "Beach-combers" ball. The Ravinia group called theirs the "Bal Musette." The first year all of those attending came dressed as French art students such as those seen in the Montmartre district in Paris.
