

**NEW STATE LAWS
AID HEALTH WORK**

SCHOOL NURSES PROVIDED

**Mosquito Abatement Planned;
Public Water Supply Safe-
guarded More Effect-
ually, Belief**

Governor Small signed half a dozen new laws described by Dr. Isaac D. Rawlings, state health director as important measures relating to the preservation and improvement of health in the state. They include statutes providing for the employment of nurses by local school boards; for the employment of a larger staff of nurses, a supervising dentist and a dietician by the state department of health; for the establishment of mosquito abatement districts; for the acquisition by municipalities of property adjacent to public water supply reservoirs; for the enlargement or construction of sanitary districts.

School Nurses

"While not ideal in some respects the law legalizing the employment of nurses by local boards of education meets a very real need and clears up a situation that has caused considerable embarrassment from time to time," Dr. Rawlings declared. "Some 125 nurses were on the pay rolls of school boards last year and their services contributed enormously to the good health record of the state. Under the new law any school board may legally pay well qualified nurses to work in the schools and it is to the interest of all concerned that none but highly efficient personnel be retained in this work."

"Appropriations made to the division of child hygiene make it possible for the state department of health to put ten additional nurses in the field for promoting the health of the infant, the child and the mother. Work in this field has demonstrated in recent years the enormous possibilities for improving the health of mothers and babies. This appropriation also provides for a dentist and dietician who will be available to promote education in those fields throughout the state."

Mosquito Abatement

"The mosquito abatement measure provides for the establishment of districts by popular vote. Trustees of these districts are empowered to a purpose of eradicating mosquitoes. Work of this character is important as a preventive of malaria in southern Illinois and as a preventive of highly disagreeable nuisance in all parts. Areas of 300 or more population may take advantage of this law."

"The public water supply law permits municipalities to acquire by purchase or condemnation land lying adjacent to reservoirs over which supervision is necessary to the safety of the water. Heretofore the municipalities were authorized to acquire only such lands as were subject to floods."

"The sanitary district law of 1917 was amended so as to provide for the enlargement or contraction of sanitary districts after they are brought into existence. This makes it possible for sanitary districts to enlarge themselves so as to serve new territory that may be taken into cities which constitute sanitary districts."

**NEW LAW PROTECTS
CHICKEN RAISERS**

**Requires License for Dealers
Who Must Keep Records
of Purchases**

The thrifty Illinois housewife who spends her summer in nursing a brood of chickens to maturity, has less to fear from the inroads of chicken thieves in the future. Not that chicken stealing has become a lost art in Illinois, but as a result of the safeguard which has been thrown around dealing in poultry in the state which bids fair to make it more difficult for the chicken thief to dispose of his loot.

Under the provisions of the law passed by the last session of the legislature dealers in poultry will be licensed and are required to keep a careful record of all business transactions. This record must show the date of the purchase, number, weight, breed, description and other distinguishing mark of live birds. In addition the dealer is required to record the name, address and brief description of the seller, together with a description of his conveyance, and if an auto, the license number of the same.

In the event a dealer makes a fictitious entry as to the name of the seller, or the seller gives other than correct answers to all questions propounded by the poultry dealer, prosecution is possible with a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 upon conviction, with a cancellation of the license of the dealer.

Fines collected by magistrates, or other officers, shall be turned over to the Department of Agriculture and by the department to the state treasury.

**BORAH TELLS EASTERN
FRIENDS WEST'S IDEA**

Senator Borah at home in Idaho made a pretty little speech the other day to some Eastern tourists at Boise.

"You sometimes read in the eastern press," he said, "about how unfriendly the West feels toward the East. I venture the opinion that your visit will chase from your thoughts that delusion. We appreciate the East, and we rejoice in your success and are proud of these magnificent old states."

"All the West asks is a square deal; in matters of national policy and national legislation, we want the whole country considered. We are not for bearing down your prosperity. We are for sharing it with you and building up the country as a whole—East, West, South and North. We want policies broad enough to take into consideration the nation as a whole and the interests of all people and localities."

"Nowhere in this country will you find more prevalent than in this region the feeling that we are one people, one country, one flag, united in one common destiny."

**WASHINGTON MADE
ONE FOURTH SPEECH**

LANCASTER, PA., IN 1791

**Diary of First President Tells
of Occasion and Is Only
Record of His Help-
ing to Celebrate**

Probably few people know that George Washington made one Fourth of July speech and only one. There is an interesting story by Henry Olney about this speech in the current issue of the National Republic magazine. The original copy of the address delivered at Lancaster, Pa., is now in the Library of Congress at Washington. Concerning this Fourth of July address by the Father of the Country Mr. Olney says in part:

"The diaries of George Washington contain only one reference to the making of a Fourth of July address. This entry was made on July 4, 1791, and read as follows:

Reference in Diary

"Monday, July 4. This being the Anniversary of American Independence and being kindly requested to do it, I agreed to halt here this day and partake of the entertainment which was preparing for the celebration of it. In forenoon I walked about the town—a half past two o'clock I received and answered an address from the Corporation and the compliments of the clergy of different denominations—dined between three and four o'clock—drank tea with Mrs. Hand."

"It is the quaint but flourishing city of Lancaster, Pa., that has the distinction of being the only town in this Republic where Washington delivered a Fourth of July speech. Lancaster, at that time, was the largest inland town in this country. It was widely known for the beautiful and fertile farms that surrounded it in all directions, and also by the fact that the Continental Congress had met there for a day when obliged to leave Philadelphia when pressed too closely by the invading British."

Guest of Honor

Never before nor since has Lancaster had a Fourth of July celebration that compared with the one in which the hero of the Revolution and the then President of the country, was the guest of honor. The news that the 'Father of His Country' would appear in person, and talk to the people, spread rapidly through the town.

**STATE WON'T PAY FOR
COUNTIES CRIME BILL**

**Governor Vetoes Measure For
Reimbursement of Fayette
and Will Counties**

Governor Small has vetoed the Jenco bill carrying an appropriation of \$20,997.50 to Will county for expenses in connection with the trial and conviction of the convict slayers of Deputy Warden Klein. The Roe bill carrying an appropriation of \$6,481 to Fayette county in connection with the trials of inmates escaping from the Vandalia State Farm was also vetoed.

In vetoing the two measures Gov. Small calls attention to the fact that the prosecution of crime is a matter for the county authorities and the state is not liable, despite the fact that the crime was committed within a state institution and the defendants were state wards.

In Will county the bill rendered was for the period between May 5, 1926, the date of the slaying of Deputy Warden Klein, and March 28, 1927, with the expectation that a second bill would be rendered covering the period up to the time of the execution, or until the remaining prisoners escaped from the Will county jail.

Effort was made during the session of the legislature to make an appropriation of \$1,000 each to five attorneys defending the prisoners, but this proposed bill was lost in committee, as establishing a precedent which would cost the state of Illinois an immense sum in future cases in paying the way for state fees in all cases in which defendants were unable to hire counsel.
