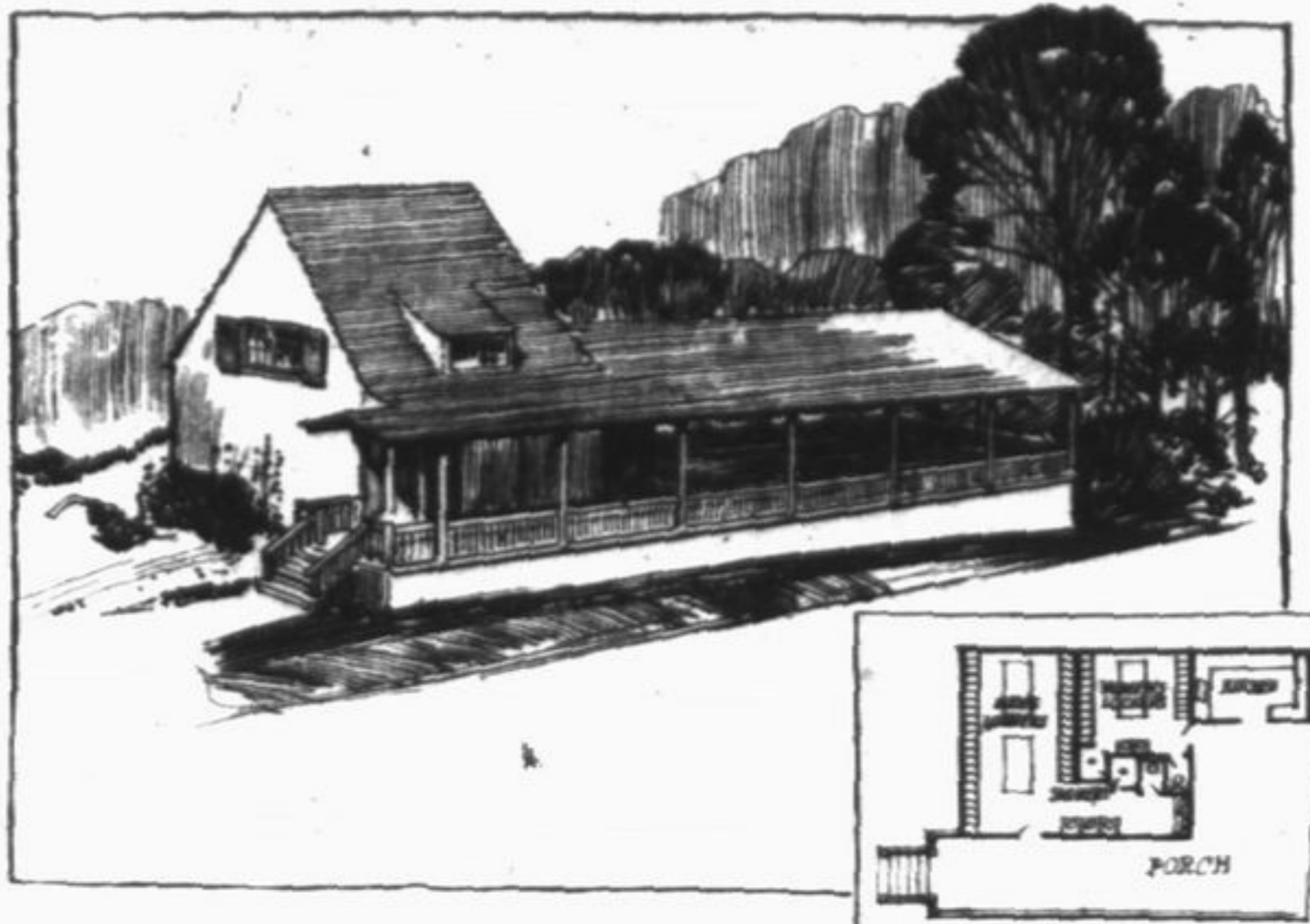

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT NOTICE NO. 312 Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois having ordered the construction of a system of sanitary sewers in Ravinia Dell and for lots 2 and 3 of a subdivision of Lots 1, 15, 16, 17, and 18 of Lakeside Manor, all in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, and by condemning therefor, the South 10 feet of Lot 1 in the Subdn. of Lots 1, 15, 16, 17, and 18 Lakeside Manor; the south 10 feet of Lot 2 in the Subdn of Lots 1, 15, 16, 17, and 18 Lakeside Manor; a strip of land ten feet in width across lot 3, the side line of which coincides with the south line of said lot 3 in the Subdn of Lots 1, 15, 16, 17, and 18, Lakeside Manor; and that part of lot 4 lying southerly of a line ten feet northeasterly of and parallel with the southerly line of lot 3 and said line extended in the Subdn of Lots 1, 15, 16, 17, and 18 Lakeside Manor; all in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois. Ravinia Tennis Club House



The Ravinia Tennis club, one of the most active and extensive in point of membership on the north shore, is to have a new club house, if present plans are carried out successfully, and much enthusiasm in favor of the project is reported in that section of the city.

Because of the increasing interest and activities in tennis in Ravinia, conditions have developed to a point where a club house is considered a necessity, and the erection of a suitable building for the purpose during next season is being planned.

In another column of this paper is shown a sketch of a drawing of the proposed structure, presenting general outlines and plan of the club house which the club is expecting to erect on its property at Pleasant and Roger Williams avenues next year.

Screened Porch

The main feature of the club house as planned is to be a large, screened veranda running along the north end of the courts just outside of the back nets, and with one end on a beautiful and well wooded ravine. This extensive porch will provide a cool, airy and comfortable place from which the tennis matches may be viewed by spectators and also an admirable place for entertaining, dancing and other social activities of the club.

Connected with the large, screened porch is a kitchen where the weekly dinners will be assembled. The locker rooms for both men and women will accommodate equipment for the members as well as showers and other facilities.

Paving Completed

The newly-paved road on Pleasant avenue, in front of the club, and on Roger Williams avenue, is now open,

making the courts easily accessible to players.

The enterprise of the Ravinia Tennis club is undertaking this project is to be commended and it is believed that the plan will be readily favored and heartily supported by all interested in the proposed club house which will prove not only a great improvement on the tennis grounds, but also provide an important addition to the sport facilities in that part of the city.

DAMAGE SUITS FILED AS ACCIDENT RESULT

Damages of \$20,000 are asked in two suits filed recently in Milwaukee as the result of a fatal automobile accident that occurred in Lake county on the night of August 24, 1926, in which a man and woman were killed. The suits were started by the husband of the woman victim and by the widow of the man victim.

The accident in question occurred two miles north of Deerfield. It is charged that a large truck had been parked on the highway without lights and that the automobile in which the two victims were riding crashed into it.

Charles Johnson of Chicago, administrator for the estate of his wife, Emily, is bringing one of the \$10,000 suits.

Mrs. Anna Johnson administrator of the estate of her husband, Otto, is bringing the other suit.

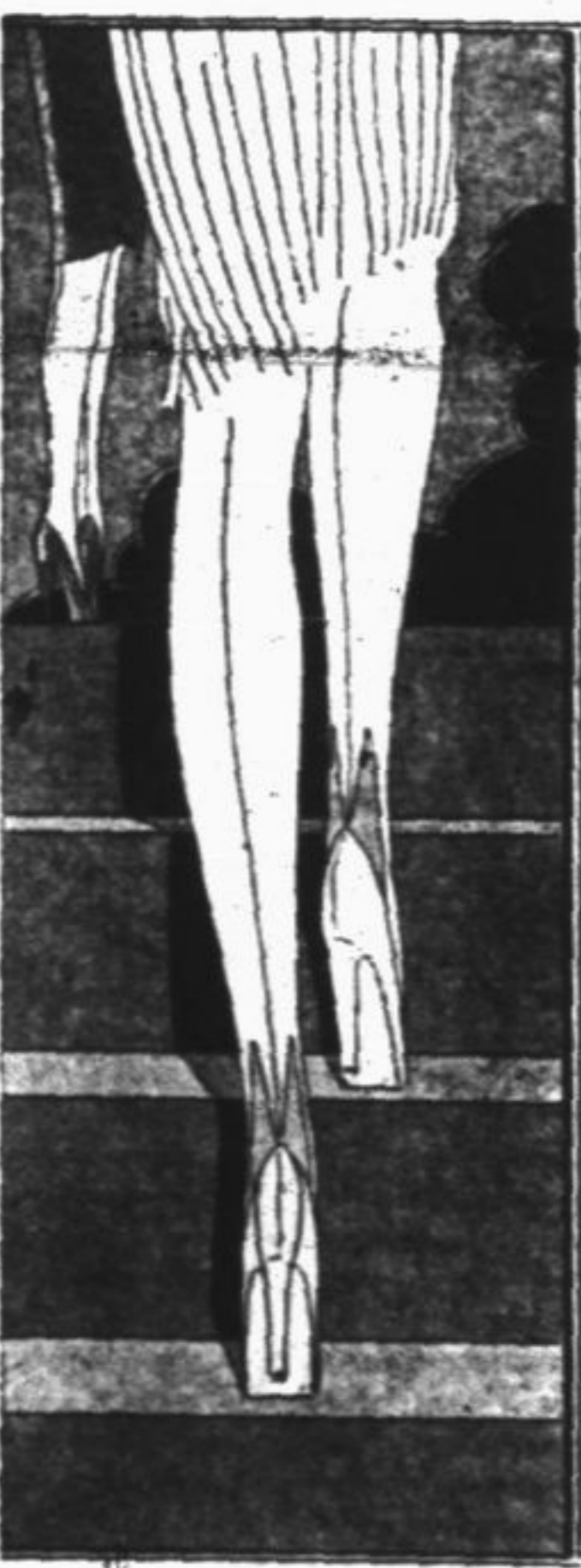
