DISCONTINUES BUS LINE TO MILWAUKEE

North Shore Line Abandons Its Plan, According to Report of Waukegan Paper

The North Shore line has discontinued its Chicago-Milwaukee motor coach line. The last bus trip was made last Sunday.

R. J. Amis, general passenger agent, Chicago, was here Friday, says the Waukegan Sun, and explained that the company did not feel justified in cutting rates so it abandoned the motor coach service.

A new coach line recently began operations between Milwaukee and Chicago and placed its rates below those of the North Shore line. The North Shore will not resume its coach service even if rates are restored to the former level, it is reported.

"Our rates were established on a reasonable basis," said Mr. Amis, "and we did not feel justified in cutting them."

The equipment of the coach line will be used on the company's bus lines feeding its interurban line, such as the Kenosha-Lake Geneva line, according to the Waukegan paper.
