C. M. T. C. BOYS GIVEN COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS

Detroit Lad Receives One From Lake Forest College; Others Who Made Mark

University and college scholarships, silver cups and medals were awarded last week to the youthful fighting men, who showed the highest military efficiency and horsemanship during their month of extensive training at Ft. Sheridan. The presentations were made by Brig. Gen. Michael J. Lenihan, commandant at the Fort and by Col. Philip Fox of the 341st reserve infantry, following a parade and review with which the camp was closed for 1927.

Elwood H. Bachman, major of infantry in the Detroit high school R. O. T. C., was awarded a silver cup, the trophy given by the 341st reserve infantry, for having attained the highest efficiency among the 1,620 men trained this year. He was a member of Troop A, 317 reserve cavalry.
