New Teachers

Among the new teachers are two men, Mr. George Hawkins, who was principal of Lake Zurich school last year, and Mr. George E. Vandyke, who has lately received his master's degree at the University of Illinois. Mr. Hawkins will teach in the Elementary school and have charge of fifth grade arithmetic. Mr. Vandyke will have classes in history, geography, eighth grade and act as Mr. Smith's assistant. Miss Lillian Fehr of the Bloomington schools comes to first grade, Miss Florence Miller of Nokomis and Miss Virginia Thomas of Danville will teach in second grade. Mrs. Carl Anderson of Deerfield will have Miss Palmer's position in third grade until February 1.

A communication from the Highland Park East Park district board accepting permit to use a portion of block 28 for bathing beach, park and playground purposes was placed on file. Other communications were received and placed on file, and a written opinion of the corporation counsel regarding installation of gasoline storage tanks was also filed.

To Improve Crossings

Engineers' plans for the improvement of Roger Williams avenue crossings were approved and the railroad companies were requested to proceed with the work as soon as possible.

The city clerk was instructed to arrange with the Chicago & Northwestern railroad officials for a meeting as soon as possible with reference to the viaducts at Sheridan place and Bloom street.

The city clerk was authorized to advertise for bids for the construction of sidewalk on the north side of Sheridan road, between Deere Park and Lambert Tree avenue, in front of lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 25, 26, 27 and 38, Lakeside Manor subdivision, bids to be received Monday, Sept. 12, at 5 o'clock.

Ask State Permit

A resolution was adopted requesting the state department of public works and buildings for a permit authorizing the city of Highland Park to tunnel the concrete pavement in Deerfield road approximately 200 feet west of Beverly place for the installation of a six-inch water main, said work not to be done by employees of the city, and authorizing city officials to sign such permit in behalf of the city.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the city collector, Fred W. Rubly, to cancel two small items of \$30 and \$13 of assessment on property of A. Lawrence Mills, in accordance with agreement with the owner at the time the assessment was spread.

The plat of the McKillip Westgate subdivision was approved and accepted, subject to the furnishing of easements for a private road as shown on the plat.

Authorize Plan Commission

An ordinance was passed providing for a Plan Commission for the city of Highland Park, including provisions for the appointment, membership, organization and duties and powers of such commission.

ADVERTISING OF GIFT ENTERPRISES ILLEGAL

Postal Law Clear on Subject; Is Quoted for Information of the Public

Because of the increasing numbers of celebrations of one kind and another, local "days," etc., in connection with which prizes depending on lotteries or chance schemes are offered, it has become necessary for the Press to call attention of the public to the law which absolutely prohibits advertisements of any such lottery, or gift enterprise depending upon chance. This sort of thing has been considerably evident of late, and the postal department, while usually willing to overlook minor infractions where the interests of a community are concerned, has pointed out that such affairs are becoming altogether too common and that newspapers and other material advertising such schemes, under the law, may be refused transportation in the mails. The Press has been careful to avoid violation of the statute in this regard, but now and then errors will creep in, and in order that the public may be informed on the matters and see clearly that a newspaper has no option in the premises but to exclude lottery prize lists and the like, the section of the law concerning this matter is herewith printed. It follows:

"No newspaper, circular, pamphlet or publication of any kind containing any advertisement of any lottery, gift enterprise, or scheme, of any kind offering prizes dependent in whole or in part upon lot or chance, or containing any list of the prizes drawn or awarded by means of any such lottery, gift enterprise or scheme, whether said list contains any part or such prizes, shall be deposited in or carried by the mails of the United States or be delivered by any postmaster or letter carrier."

south line of Lake county to a line just north of Waukegan and from Lake Michigan to a west boundary one or two miles from the lake. There have been two annexations. One extended the boundary north to the Wisconsin line and the other moved the westerly limits about a mile to the west.

After appointment and organization, the first work of the trustees was to prepare a sanitary survey or fact-finding report of the district. This work was entrusted to Pearce and Greeley (now Pearce, Greeley and Hansen), engineers of Chicago who submitted a report in June 1915 of some 300 pages describing the population, area, topography, geology, climatology, existing water and sewerage works, construction conditions and costs, characteristics of Lake Michigan water and other features of the district pertinent to the sewage disposal problem. Many actual gaugings of sewage flow were made over weirs built into the principal sewers for that purpose.

In September, 1915, all of this data was submitted to a board of engineers consisting of Harrison P. Eddy of Boston, George W. Fuller of New York and John W. Alvord of Chicago. These eminent engineers, constituting the best knowledge and experience in America on sewage disposal matters, made a thorough study of the district, developed 17 projects for sewage disposal works, one of which they selected as the preferred project and recommended sewage disposal by sedimentation and chlorination for lake front plants, and by sedimentation and filtration for plants discharging into the Skokie. Their report was printed and distributed in May, 1916. The unsettled conditions incident to the World war caused a postponement of several years and the first sewage disposal plants were put under contract in 1922.

The design and construction of the sewage disposal works of the district have been entrusted by the trustees to Pearce, Greeley and Hansen, sanitary engineers of Chicago. Mr. Alexander F. Beaubien, attorney for the district, has handled all the many legal matters pertaining to these projects. To date six sewage treatment plants with intercepting sewers and pumping stations have been built and put into operation and one is under construction. All of the seven have tax revenues at an aggregate construction cost in round numbers of \$375,000. Two of the plants are in Highland Park and one each in Highland Park and one each in Highland Park, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, North Chicago (under construction) and Waukegan. Several more plants are projected for early construction.

The sewage disposal works are of modern and proven design in use by many other communities having expert engineering guidance, with ample capacity for the local conditions along the North Shore. "An American Tragedy," Theodore Dreiser's celebrated novel of an impressionable young weakling who blunders through life, finding romance with a factory girl whom he drowns in the dark, little lake, has been successfully dramatized.
