married Christian Dahlem. Another married Jacob Hirtzel. Another sister married Matthias Fehlman, a brother of Jacob Fehlman, father of Mrs. James Fritsch.

David Fritsch drove to Elgin to get his wheat ground by Christian Dahlem. The mills ran all night, with day and night shifts. On one trip the wheat became wet in a rain storm and Mr. Fritsch and the miller declared that it made the best flour.

Mr. Fritsch's family physicians were Dr. Mergeler and Dr. Burritt of Half Day, and Dr. Mowers' medicines were herbs, which he kept tied in paper. He carried them in old-fashioned saddlebags, and when he wanted certain medicines he would get out papers, open them, and smell of the contents in order to ascertain which medicine he wanted for that particular case.

James married Susan Fehlman, daughter of Jacob Fehlman and Mary Elizabeth Mack Fehlman. She was born October 26, 1850, in Warren, Pennsylvania.

Fred Fritsch married Barbara Strubler, whose parents lived in Pennsylvania and who had a brother living on Milwaukee avenue. They had six daughters, Salome, Lena, Mary, Margaret, Sarah, and Carrie, and one son, Edward.

Salome married Michael Knopf. They had no children. Lena married Lawrence Koebelin and moved to California, where she died. They had one son, Frederick, who was brought to Illinois and was cared for by his grandparents.

Mary married George Miller, son of George Miller, and had two sons, Gilbert and Harry, and two daughters, Lillie and Mabel. Gilbert married Annie Mattmiller, and had two children, Evelyn and Lillian. Lillian died at about twenty years of age.

Some years after the death of Annie Miller, Gilbert married as his second wife, Agnes. They have one daughter, Gertrude. Harry is married and has five children. Lillie married John Zahn, son of Peter and Margaret Zahn. They have no children.

Mabel married Samuel Nordorf. They have one adopted child. After the death of George Miller, Mary Miller moved to California. She later married George Bolds, and lived in California until the time of her death.

Margaret married Ralph Brusck, and had three children, Belle, Pearl, and George. Sarah married Henry Plagge, son of Fred and Margareth Plagge, and had four daughters, Luella, Una, Verna, and Winifred. Verna died in infancy.

Luella is living in Chicago. Una married Floyd Stanger, son of George and Ida Rockenbach Stanger, and grandson of Philip Rockenbach and Mary Schmitt Rockenbach, daughter of John and Catharina Schmidt. The Floyd Stangers have two sons, Clifford and George. They live in Deerfield.
