BIG GAS PURCHASE IS NOT ECONOMICAL

Motorists making excessive purchases of gasoline in the eleventh hour before the state tax of two cents became effective, were "penny wise and pound foolish," in the opinion of service station attendants. They declare loss from evaporation and in pouring from containers into tanks on automobiles will more than make up for the apparent saving of two cents a gallon.

From all parts of the state reports have come in that sales at service stations on July 31 were from 300 to 1,000 gallons in excess of their daily averages. This is accepted as evidence of a large amount of gasoline being stored by autoists. With this report also comes announcements that purchasers came to service stations with all manner of containers to be filled, despite the fact the state law forbids handling of gasoline in other than containers which are painted red.

Insurance companies are taking notice of the greater fire risks resulting from the storage of gasoline in homes, basements of houses and in garages and are prepared to contest insurance. City fire departments are also issuing warnings against this storage of gasoline.
