Boy Scout News

The executive board of the North Shore Area council of the Boy Scouts of America announced early this week the objectives for the various committees for the coming year. The committee chairmen are:

Dr. Geo. B. Lake of Highland Park, committee on advancement and court of honor; Karl D. King of Wilmette, committee on effective troop organization; R. Arthur Wood of Highland Park, committee in civic relationships and service; C. A. Steele of Glencoe, committee on camping and outdoor activities; Henry Fowler of Wilmette, committee on finance and budget; W. A. Bimson, Lake Bluff, committee on leadership training and personnel; H. W. Shaw of Wilmette, committee on character through Sea Scouting; Rev. F. Pipenbrok of Deerfield, committee on good reading program.

The purpose and objectives of the committee are stated as follows:

Committee Work
Committee on court of honor and advancement, conducts boards of review and courts of award, and uses every possible means to stimulate advancement in rank by every scout in every troop.

The committee on effective troop organization is concerned with the proper and permanent organization of each existing troop. The committee recommends a standard troop committee, made up of 5 men, each with a service responsibility relationship to the troop. The committee on effective troop organization also has jurisdiction in the organization of new troops, and attempts to co-operate with institutions in organizing additional troops when needed.

The committee on civic relationship and service is concerned with interesting all such groups as the American Legion, Rotary, Kiwanis, American Business clubs, Optimist, P. T. A. in scouting, and with working out plans in which scouts may do civic or community service.

The committee on camping and outdoor activities is particularly interested in keeping the "out" emphasis in the program of each troop, in providing opportunity for week-end hikes, and for summer camping opportunity.

The committee on leadership personnel and training is concerned with the securing of opportunities for scout leader growth, through training courses, conferences, etc.

The committee on character through sea scouting is concerned with providing opportunity for scouts to graduate into the older boy program of Sea Scouting.

The committee on library program is concerned with library

and school co-operation, particularly in regard to the recreational reading program of boys. This committee is interested in having sets of Merit Badge pamphlets in all libraries, and in getting as many boys as possible to read "Boy's Life" and "The American Boy."

The committee on educational publicity attempts through newspapers, speakers, etc. to keep the public informed as to scouting's program and aims.

The committee on finance and budget is concerned with the securing and disbursing the funds that make this program possible in our council.
