WIDER SCOPE IN WELFARE ACTIVITY

PLANNED AT CONVENTION

Course of Study to Begin Two Days Before Conference In Joliet In October, Says State Report

Wider scope of activities will be taken by the Illinois Conference on Public Welfare during an annual session to be held at Joliet in October, in a course of study to begin two days in advance of the conference. The course is not offered as a substitute for regular professional training, and therefore is open only to those already engaged in or directly concerned in social work.

Five Courses Arranged

Five courses of study are arranged. Each course will consist of four sessions of one and one-half hours each, with the enrollment in each course restricted and no one allowed to take more than two courses.

Courses Arranged Courses are arranged as follows: Problems of Admission Planment and Discharge by Child-Caring Institutions and Agencies; Probation Methods; Administration of Mothers' Pensions; Mental Factors in Social Case Work and Fundamental Principles of Social Case Work.

Registration for the courses are open to persons in Illinois who are engaged in social work; volunteer workers who are depoting regular time to social work; public officers who administer various forms of social work, such as judges, school attendance officers, probation officers, city welfare directors, staff members of state, county and city institutions and the like, and board members of social agencies.

AMERICANIZATION PHASE

Living In a Bath Age, Says Head of Cleanliness Institute; Declares Room for Improvement

A new phase of the Americanization crusade is being developed, which may well be termined "Cleanlinization." This development, according to the government health authorities, is based on the principle that every unclean person is a potential center of infection and a menace to the nation.

"We are living in a Bath Age," writes Roscoe C. Edlund of the Cleanliness Institute, "but we still have a long way to go before we exhaust the possibilities of modern knowledge on the importance of cleanliness. There are still millions of people in the United States who are almost oblivious to the dangers resulting from lack of proper hygienic measures.

"It is just as important, in our Americanzation campaigns, to teach the virtues of cleanliness as it is to teach the rudiments of politics. Dirt is the soil from which many of our vices spring. There is a general agreement among those responsible for planning and conducting civic betterment activities that a high standard of cleanliness is an asset in their work."


