REPORTS RABIES AMONG DOGS ON NORTH SHORE

Winnetka Paper Gives Statement of Health Officers Regarding Situation

The rabies situation continues to be a menace—not only to the lives of the canines but also the children—on the north shore, according to the Winnetka Talk.

There is now an impending epidemic of rabies among canines in Wilmette, and Dr. H. A. Orvis, health officer for Kenilworth and Winnetka in discussing the matter said:

"In Winnetka we have acquired control of the situation, at least for the time being, and we hope for several months.

"This has been accomplished by the co-operation of the citizens in following advice for inoculation of the dogs. It was done in a large percentage of them.

"In Kenilworth, our response is as yet not sufficient to allow us to relax our regulations. In Kenilworth inoculation of dogs is much more complete by September 15, I will have to recommend the continuance of the muzzling ordinance for some time and also the strict prohibition of dogs on school grounds.

"Wilmette, unfortunately has a serious outbreak of rabies, with three dogs dead from the disease and several under observation. How many more may have been bitten is not known.

"The contiguity of our north shore villages makes the problem of one of them common to all.

WISCONSIN HIGHWAY, U. S. 41, HAS DETOUR

Other Information on Routes in That State; Best Way to the Dells

Highway U S 41 in Wisconsin is closed just out of Milwaukee because of street construction and road widening. A detour is being used over concrete roads. The only other detour in Wisconsin on this route is between Big Saamico and Brookside, over gravel county roads.

Wis. 55—There is a rough stretch on this highway near Lily. This causes no trouble except after heavy rain.

The two preferred routes to the Dells at the present time are: Ill. 5 to Rockford; Ill. 2 from Rockford to Beloit; US 51 from Beloit to Janesville; Wis. 13 from Janesville to Madison; US 51 from Madison to Portage and US 16 from Portage to the Dells. This is an all surfaced road.

Ill. 42A and US 41 to Milwaukee; US 16 from Milwaukee through Columbus and Portage to the Dells.
