The solution of our problem is not "no church" but a better church," not "no religion" but a Lecture room for all who seek to religion which meets the deepest needs of our life in a broad, sympathetic and helpful way. We aim to make our church a constructive force for good in the community, and we will appreciate any personal interest and help in this work that people not affiliated elsewhere may give us.
