The sermon this Sunday will be the second in a series on the general theme of "Human Nature in the Old Testament." The subject for this Sunday is "Running Away From God and Duty." This sermon is based on the book of Jonah which many people know only in connection with the incident of the "whale." The series is based upon certain outstanding and familiar Old Testament stories and aims at a practical interpretation of these stories with a view to gleaming for ourselves their abiding religious value. Our attendance last Sunday was indeed gratifying and the general interest and participation on part of all present gave promise of renewed life and activity after the vacation season. We were happy to greet the visitors and friends that came to worship with us, and we extend to them and to others the cordial invitation to be with us whenever possible. For the information of interested people in the community it may be well to mention two facts in this connection. First, it seems there are still many people who labor under the impression that our church is essentially a German church, and that at least some of our services are conducted in the German language. While most of our people are of German descent and are able to converse in the German language, our services as well as our Sunday school are conducted entirely in the language of our country. This is a concession on part of those of our members who would appreciate German services to the young people and to others who are not familiar with the German language. However, this concession is willingly made and is being rewarded in the widening circle of those who attend our services. Then this other point. It seems to be taken for granted by some people that our church is a distinctly denominationalistic body which appeals only to a restricted group, or to people of a certain temperament. While we are a member of a denomination, the Evangelical Synod of North America, locally, at least, we are not denominationalistic in emphasis nor exclusive in spirit. Freedom of conscience for the individual in matters of belief and interpretation is a cardinal principle of our church. This should make a genuine appeal to many who are not affiliated with any church locally. The solution of our problem is not "no church" but a better church, not "no religion" but a religion which meets the deepest needs of our life in a broad, sympathetic and helpful way. We aim to make our church a constructive force for good in the community, and we will appreciate any personal interest and help in this work that people not affiliated elsewhere may give us.
