Miss Caroline McIlvaine, of the Historical society had an article in the Chicago Daily News last week in her series on Historical Sports in Chicago, on Chicago's First Forest Preserves. In it she cites the fact that "the second unit that was tendered for a public park was lovely Egandale, the memorial established by Dr. Williams B. Egan, lying between Forty-Seventh and Fifty-First streets, Cottage Grove and Woodland avenues. Here this genial Irish country gentleman had transformed the open prairie into such a garden as only a poet could imagine, planting carloads of evergreen trees, and deciduous trees of every variety, not forgetting peach, cherry, pear and apple trees, and establishing nurseries where rare trees were propagated by skilled gardeners. It is said that for many years vestiges of this nursery grew and flourished, and lovely artificial mounds surmounted by rustic summer houses, bore evidence of the rare taste of the Egans. Some of the older citizens remember that strawberries and other small fruits were raised in profusion and in their season drew gay driving parties out to his Country estate, where it was the doctor's delight to dispense hospitality with a lavish hand.

The description of this beautiful estate has been duplicated in a similar manner by Dr. Egan's son, William C. Egan, in his beautiful estate, also called Egandale, on Ravine place near Lake Michigan, in Highland Park. This estate furnishes an endless variety of blooms for each succeeding month, and has trees of every description within its borders.
