reference to a sidewalk on Linden avenue, and the city clerk was instructed to notify the property owners that the west side of the street was considered by the engineers the best for the installation of the walk, and the clerk also was authorized to get in touch with the property owners who have agreed to help pay for the improvement.

Commissioner Gourley moved that the ordinance providing for the turning over of Memorial park to the Park board be filed for inspection. The motion for final passage of the Tax Levy ordinance was made by Commissioner Reay. The amounts to be levied for the several city departments and purposes are listed as follows:

Features of Tax Levy
Salaries of officers, \$18,160; street and alley fund, \$38,500; bridge fund, \$8,034; street lighting fund, \$12,300; general sewage fund, \$3,400; police department, \$30,370; fire department, \$20,430; city buildings, care and maintenance, etc., \$4,275; city parks, \$500; public benefits, \$14,000; garbage disposal fund, \$6,100 public library fund, \$14,000; bonded indebtedness, \$15,825; total, \$212,794.

The appropriation ordinance, passed some weeks ago, appropriates all of the funds included in the tax levy ordinance, which is the money to be raised by taxation, and also all other revenues of the city from all other sources.

Board Meeting
Award of the contract for the paving of Briargate Villas to the North American Construction Co., was moved by Member Zimmer when the board of local improvements convened, they being the lowest responsible bidders.

On motions of Member Gourley resolutions were adopted originating water main improvements in Nixon's

Highland Park acres and Hovland's Highland Park acres, and Sherwood Manor and first addition to Sherwood Manor subdivisions.

On motion of Member Gourley the engineers were instructed to prepare an estimate of cost of water mains in County Line road, in accordance with a petition presented therefor.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF TAXES FOR THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK FOR THE YEAR 1927. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION 1: That the Annual Appropriation bill making appropriations for corporate purposes for the City of Highland Park ending April 30th, 1928 was filed the 15th day of July, A. D. 1927, and approved the 25th day of July, A. D. 1927, and thereafter published as provided by law, which said ordinance by reference is hereby made a part hereof.

SECTION 2: That the sum of Two Hundred Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-Four Dollars (\$212,794.00) having been heretofore legally appropriated and hereby levied respectively are as follows, to-wit:

SALARIES OF CITY OFFICERS
For salaries of City Officers \$18,160.00

STREET AND ALLEY FUND
For maintaining and repairing streets and alleys 38,500.00

BRIDGE FUND
For maintaining and repairing bridges 8,034.00

STREET LIGHTING FUND
For lighting streets, parks and public buildings 12,300.00

GENERAL SEWERAGE FUND
For maintaining and repairing sewers 3,400.00

POLICE DEPARTMENT
For salaries and expenses of Police Department 30,370.00

FIRE DEPARTMENT
For salaries and expenses of Fire Department 20,430.00

BOARD OF HEALTH
For salaries and expenses of Health Department 2,900.00

CITY BUILDINGS
For maintenance and care of City Buildings 4,275.00

CITY PARKS
For maintenance and upkeep of City Parks 500.00

PUBLIC BENEFITS
For payment of Public Benefits, principal and interest thereon 14,000.00

GARBAGE DISPOSAL FUND
For expense in operating a system or plant for disposal of garbage 6,100.00

PUBLIC LIBRARY
For salaries and expenses of Public Library 14,000.00
For Sinking Fund (to provide a sinking fund for the construction of a new Library Bldg.) 24,000.00
BONDED INDEBTEDNESS
For payment of maturing bonds and interest on Bonded Indebtedness 15,825.00
TOTAL AMOUNT LEVIED \$212,794.00
SECTION 3: The City Clerk of the City of Highland Park is hereby directed to file

a certified copy of this ordinance with the County Clerk of Lake County in the State of Illinois, as required by law.
SECTION 4: This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and approval.
