School officials are responsible for the safety of the children and it is their duty to provide fire-safe buildings, ample exits and to have regular fire drills.

A similar responsibility and duty rests upon those having charge of theaters, hospitals, churches, hotels, public halls and other places where fire would endanger lives.

Public officials should enforce strict fire regulations by proper ordinances and systematic inspections.

Mayors, fire chiefs, Chambers of Commerce and civic organizations should co-operate to see that a practical observance of Fire Prevention Week is had in every community. Instructive talks and programs should be held in schools. It is suggested that civic organizations devote a meeting in October to fire prevention and that this meeting be during Fire Prevention Week if possible. Co-operation of press and pulpit is also in-
