## BAGGAGE MAN IN ROLE OF EDUCATOR

#### Distributes Newspapers From Train to Poor Whites of Mountains

Robert M. Cobb, baggage master on the Southern railway, has come to be regarded as the greatest source of Item No. 7 education in the south by mountaineers along the line between Atlanta, Ga., and Salisbury, N. C., the American Magazine learns from a southern correspondent.

When the whistle of the express begins to echo down the passes and valleys, the mountain people, many of whom go to town only once or twice a year, begin trekking toward the railroad and, when the train has roared through, they find in the clear- Item No. 8. ings at certain spots large bundles of newspapers and magazines which Cobb hurls from the racing train.

Until a few months ago trainmen piled all the abandoned papers and books in the baggage car to be destroyed at the end of the division. Cobb then developed the scheme of bundling them and, after conferring with mountaineers he met on their infrequent visits to towns, told them where he would drop the packages. The result is the creation of a circulating library that provides practically all of the reading matter available to the mountain people.


