Nobody seems to have seen the aged couple knocked down, and the first that was known of the accident was when they were discovered lying on the pavement. The police have a theory that Mr. Pierson was struck, perhaps, first, and knocked against his wife, who fell with him. It is regarded as just possible that the fender of the car may have brushed them down and that the driver may not have noticed that his machine had struck anything. However, this is regarded as problematical, as usually a driver readily feels any slight jolt caused by his car striking an object.

BREAKERS BEACH GOLF CLUB PRO SOON CHOSEN

For Fine New Club Being Constructed Near Glenview; Has 45 Holes

Selection of a "pro" to direct the new golf division of the Breakers Beach club, exclusive north shore business men's organization, will be made shortly, J. E. Roy, president, announces today.

The golf division will have an eighteen-hole and a nine-hole golf course ready for play in the spring. The property is on Waukegan road, fifteen minutes from the club house at Wilmette. An additional eighteen-hole course will be constructed in the spring with bride paths and several batteries of tennis courts. As a feature also, the country home now there is being converted into a modern clubhouse.

The golf courses are being laid out by Leonard Macomber, one of the best known architects in the country. He built the Mission Hills Country club, the Biltmore Country club, the Poland Country club, of Youngstown, and many others. Assisting him is Benjamin J. Gage, who planned the Wilmette Park system, and designed the Skokie Heights and the Knollwood Golf club.

The Breakers Beach club has a membership of 3,000 of the most prominent business men in Chicago, with a majority living in Wilmette, Evanston, Winnetka, Highland Park and Lake Forest. The first unit of the clubhouse, which is to be a twelve-story structure, will soon be open. The property has a frontage of 353 feet on the lake.
