MATHIAS HERMANN PIONEER RESIDENT

CAME TO DEERFIELD 1852

Mrs. John C. Huehl a Descendant; Were Former Owners of Lank Known as Bannockburn

Mathias Herrmann was born on January 20, 1830 at Muntzenheim, Alsace, France...

Mathias Herrmann was a brother of Marie Herrmann who remained in France and of John and Jacob Herrmann who came to America.

During the cholera epidemic Mathias set up a cobbler's shop in what is now known as Wheeling, Ill.

Barbara Selig Herrmann was a sister of May Salome Selig, George and Mathias Selig who remained in France and Magdalena Selig...

While living in Chicago, which in those days, was often referred to as "the mud hole," Mrs. Herrmann suggested that they purchase some acreage...

In 1923 Mr. and Mrs. John C. Huehl sold sixty-three acres to William Aitken of Hubbard Woods...

On November 2, 1864, Mr. Herrmann received his final certificate of naturalization...
