The object of the organization is to aid the peace officers throughout the state in preventing crime within their communities and incidentally, to protect the deposits in the banks from peril of criminal assault.

PLAN STUDY COURSE FOR SOCIAL WORKERS

During the two days preceding the Illinois conference on Public Welfare, to be held at Joliet on October 18, 19 and 20, a study course for social workers will open.

Five courses of study are arranged. Each course will consist of four sessions of one and one-half hours each, with the enrollment restricted and no one allowed to take more than two

Courses are arranged as follows: Problems of Admission, Placement and Discharge by Child-Caring Institutions and Agencies; Probation Methods: Administration of Mothers' Pensions; Mental Factor in Social Case Work, and Fundamental Principles of Social Case Work.

Registration for the courses is open to persons in Illinois who are engaged in social work; volunteer workers who are devoting regular time to social work; public officers who administer various forms of social work, such as judges, school attendance officers, probation officers, city welfare directors, staff members of state, county and city institutions and the like and board members of social

TELEPHONE AID TO SPEECH AND HEARING

Claimed Left Ear Is Rendered More Keen By Use of ... Phone; Talking

Left ears of people who make extensive use of the telephone have be come more proficient than the anditory member on the right side of the head, according to medical reports. The constant application of telephone receivers to the left ear has served to increase the accuracy of the sense of hearing on that side. Meanwhile the right ear, while by no means suffering from any deficiency, has lagged behind the other member in progressiveness.

All telephone instruments are installed with the receiver on the left side in order that the great majority of people who are right-handed may have that hand free for writing during their conversations. This has naturally developed the tendency among all telephone users to listen with their left ear, while the right hearing organ has remained idle. In cases where telephone subscribers are lefthanded or have a deficient left ear, telephone instruments may be adjusted by reversing the transmitters so that the receiver hook will be on the right side.


