

**FREDERICK PIERCE TO GIVE LECTURE SERIES**

**Internationally Known Clinical and Research Psychologist Will Talk at Club**

Frederick Pierce, the internationally known clinical and research psychologist, author and lecturer, who wrote "Our Unconscious Mind and How to Use It," which is in its seventh edition, "Mobilizing the Mid-Brain," and "Expert Child Management," spends a third of his time each year in Geneva and Vienna where he was trained.

His lecture course that will be given in Highland Park during November is as fascinating as the presentation of such work can be. Mr. Pierce shows the unconscious mind a comprehensive thing, which his audience grasp with ease and absorbed interest. He demonstrates what the new knowledge is accomplishing for both adults and children in new health, and power in mind and body.

Mr. Pierce has appeared before women's clubs from the Atlantic to the Pacific oceans, and insistent demands are made for return engagements. The Evanston Woman's club is having him for the second season. The idea which Mr. Pierce presents is more advanced than the Cane idea.

**HOW TO REACH P. T. A. CONFERENCE IN BERWYN**
