she carried a bouquet of lilies of the valley and gardenias.

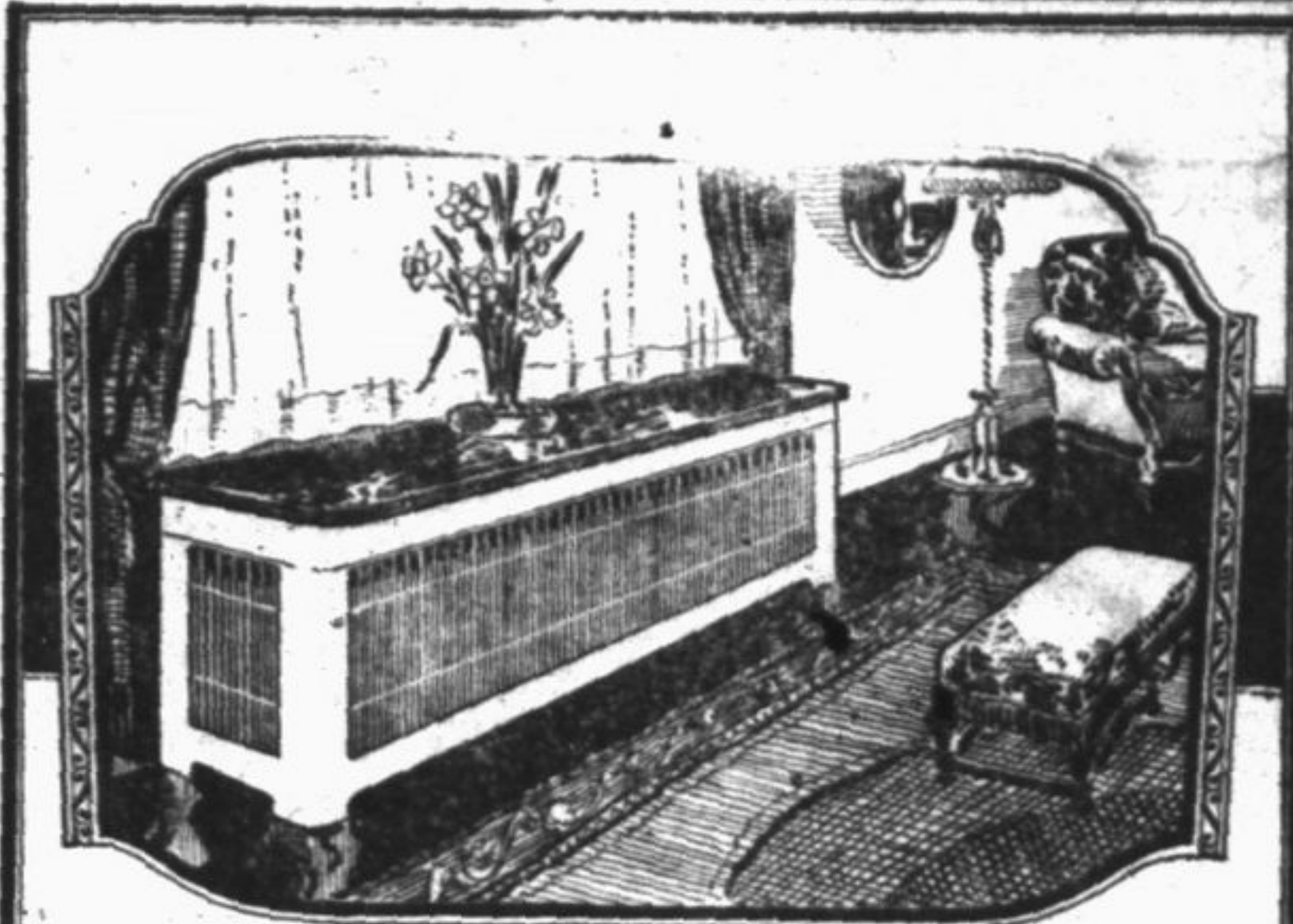
