Walt Whitman and the public schools, have more space—as they should have—than empty-headed presidents like Pierce and Fillmore. For this is not history in its conventional mold, not history with its high lights on the careers of politicians, but history, warm, vibrant, human and authentic—with its high lights on the nation.

There is nothing pedantic or soporific about Walter Lippman's chapters on "Men of Destiny." They are so keen and outspoken as to be positively exciting, and their ironic humor is delightful. He discusses President Coolidge, Al Smith, Borah, Mencken, the question of censorship, the dogmas of majority rule, and sundry other interesting public men and matters. The New York Times, commenting

on "Men of Destiny," says, "Mr. Lippman's gift is for analysis. He is clear, incisive, unperturbed. He hates injustice, but he hates loose thinking even more."

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
