

OIL SUBSTITUTION BANE OF MOTORISTS

STATE LAWS ARE URGED

Unscrupulous Filling Station Operators Often Sell Inferior Grades; Draining; Etc.; Problem

Motorists must look to their own state legislatures rather than to congress for relief from the oil substitution frauds revealed by the American Fair Trade association. Government experts endorse the association's statements concerning the huge losses due to improper lubrication of the nation's autos, but point out that the detection and punishment of dishonest service station men is a problem for the state to solve according to local conditions.

Victimizing Motorists
Prosecutions of dealers for victimizing motorists by substituting inferior oils, and in some instances, crank case drainings, for high grade lubricants, have attracted widespread attention summer. These cases have served to show the extent of the practice and the need of legislation to curb it.

It now seems probable that bills for this purpose will be introduced in every legislature meeting next January in states not already provided with adequate anti-substitution laws. The governor of Rhode Island already has expressed his purpose to devote attention to this situation in his annual message.

While substitution frauds are limited to a small proportion of dealers, the enormous numbers of motor cars in use — one for every five persons — and the multiplication of new service stations all over the country make these frauds very serious in the aggregate.

Hard to Convict

The average motorist is rapidly being educated to use the kind of oil best suited to his needs and to demand this oil by name and grade. He has little protection, however, against the dishonest dealer who does not give him the oil he orders. In many states under existing laws it has been found difficult to convict substitutors even with the strongest evidence against them.

WOMEN NO LONGER ARE THRILLED BY FREEDOM

Writer in Magazine Says Present Attempt to Imitate Men Will Pass

"The present period of imitation of men by women will pass," says Dr. Will Durant, author of "The Story of Philosophy," discussing the status of modern women in the American Magazine.

"Those women who carry emancipation onward will seek not to be imperfect men but to become perfect women," he continues. "They will make motherhood an art involving as much preparation and intelligence as the manipulation of levers and pulleys and throttles and wheels."

Dr. Durant believes that the fundamental differences between men and women were so complicated that the test had to come of whether or not they could occupy the same sphere. "It was a test almost cosmic," he says. "The result of it was so rapid a transformation that all the world stood agape. Within three generations these new servitors of industry made their way into every field where physical strength was not indispensable. And in every field they acquired enough of the intellectual and moral quality of the male to make every moralist in Christendom deplore the masculinization of the once gentler and weaker sex."

Women lawyers, physicians, governors, bandits, demonstrated the ability of women, within their still narrow opportunities, to rival the arts of the pre-established male. Colleges graduated women no man would marry because their intellectual superiority excluded certain masculine pretensions to leadership which are among the prerequisites of marriage.

"But women's new freedom brought them problems as complex and crucial as those that lay in their old slavery. Only their new knowledge can cope with this new situation. Probably they will succeed in finding a way to unite that radiant beauty and alert intelligence which distinguishes women today with that modest tenderness which flowers in loyal love and perfect motherhood."

CHINESE MONEY BELTS EXHIBITED AT MUSEUM

Fine Collection of Beautiful and Valuable Curios of This Type

A collection of beautiful and valuable Chinese money belts, embroidered with glass beads of various colors in intricate designs, mounted on leather, which was presented to Field Museum of Natural History by Mrs. George T. Smith of Chicago, was placed on exhibition at the museum.

The beads are of cut glass, and each is sewed on separately. The belts are fine examples of artistry, and of the exercise of extreme patience in delicate hand work. The designs are all characteristically Chinese, consisting of flowers, birds, bats, goldfish, carp and butterflies. In a few, animals like deer, and human figures are represented. The magpie, a bird of lucky omen to the Chinese, appears frequently. Ornamental forms of the character "shou," Chinese symbol for "longevity," are conspicuous, indicating the universal desire among the Chinese to attain long life.

Most of the belts are provided with silver buckles which have embossed figures of lions and dragons, and sometimes a gold-plated central panel. On the inside of the belts are pockets for the safe carrying of money. Most of the belts were made during the last 100 years, and come from the south of China.

In addition to the belts, the collection contains elaborate spectacle cases, ornaments for beds, and slippers, complicating other uses of the same type of bead ornamentation.

Mrs. Smith, the donor of the collection, was also the leader of the group of Chicagoans who purchased for the museum the noted Bahr collection of Chinese archaic jades, recently placed on exhibition.

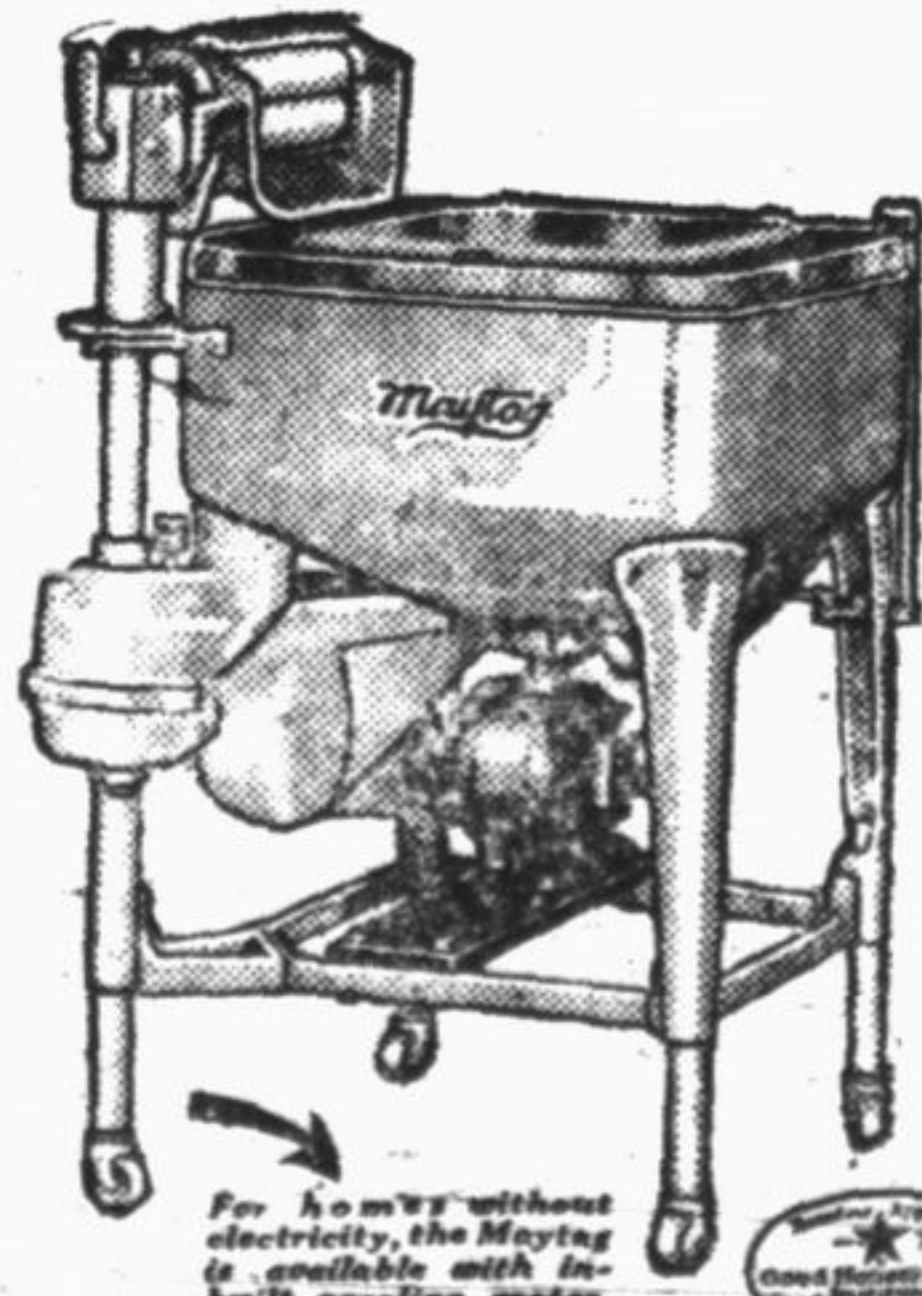
