INHERITANCE TAX ON CARQUEVILLE ESTATE

The inheritance tax on the estate of Mrs. Eva Jeffrey Carqueville, wealthy Highland Park resident, who died some time ago was set at \$35,229.38 by Eugene K. Lutes, appraiser of the estate. His report was filed last week in the Lake county court and approved by Judge Perry L. Persons.

The report states that the total value of the estate is \$958,789.39. Reductions, however, amounting to \$146,495.40 were allowed by law, making the net value of the estate \$812,293.99.

BETTER PROTECTION FOR FARM PRODUCTS

A total of \$853,000,000 worth of American farm products were exported during the year ending June 30, 1927, an increase of more than 13 per cent over the previous year. The exports of gains and principal cereals, ran to \$402,000,000, a 54 per cent increase over the 1926 figure. The black spot was the increase, however, in the value of foreign agricultural products imported into this country. It is plain that what the farmer needs is an increase in tariff protection rather than the abandonment of that American principle.

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN QUARANTINE SYSTEM

Alterations in Regulations Recently Made by Law in State of Illinois

Important changes in quarantine regulations calculated to relieve hardships on families concerned, are announced by Dr. Isaac D. Rawlings, director, Department of Public Health. Copies of the new regulations are available upon request.

"More accurate knowledge concerning contagious diseases has made it possible to modify our regulations so as to provide more absolute control measures and at the same time cause less hardships to families than the old regulations involved," Dr. Rawlings said.

"In typhoid fever, for example, quarantine is now lifted as soon as two specimens, taken at 24 hour intervals from patients who have appeared normal for ten days, show negative laboratory results. Contacts from the patients, however, must be immunized or quarantined and food handlers must get a third degree test.

"The minimum quarantine period of diphtheria has been reduced to fifteen days, and even that may be shortened if laboratory tests prove negative on patients who have lost all physical manifestations of the disease. Special regulations are specified for carriers and contacts and especially where school children are involved.

"In scarlet fever, children other than the patient in the household may be regarded as immune from the disease when they show negative results to the Dick susceptibility test. This is the regular procedure performed on the forearm.

"Fox chickenpox, measles, whooping cough, German measles and mumps the quarantine periods have been shortened to new minimum lengths ranging from five to eight days after onset, but in all cases the quarantine must continue until all physical manifestations of the disease have disappeared.
