At the present time this club is without an advisor, and its growth and development are consequently restricted and hampered. Miss Claire Kennedy who acted in this capacity last year is in Europe and her absence is felt very strongly by the club. There is a real need for active volunteer leadership of this group of interesting young girls. Any person who would like this opportunity would receive the support and help of the girl Reserve secretary and a Committee of the Y.W.C.A.
