

SEVENTY-NINE STUDENTS MAKE THE HONOR ROLL

Records for First Six Weeks; Seniors and Freshmen are Tied Is Report

Seventy-nine students of Deerfield-Shields high school who compose about eight per cent of the school, are represented on the honor roll for the first six weeks. Of these, thirty-two are boys and forty-seven are girls.

The seniors and freshmen tied for

first honors, each having seven students represented. The seniors also lead the second honors, seventeen to their number being included. This gave the seniors a total of twenty-four students on the entire honor roll, the freshmen following with twenty-two.

About six per cent of the boys in school made the honor roll, while ten per cent of the girls were able to attain this distinction.

Elise Weisenberger, a senior, and Arthur Magnani, a junior are tied for first honors.
