HIGHWOOD CITY HAS MANY IMPROVEMENTS

pleted in addition to the already extensive improvements in the city, Highwood will be, as previously stated, one of the best paved small cities in Illinois.

Plan New Light System
 Still further improvements are being planned, the first of which is a new city lighting system to cost about \$50,000, and which contemplates a complete business and residence district system of ornamental lamp posts.

In the business district the present year has seen more building improvements than any recent year in the city's history, with an estimated total cost of about \$215,000. Among the principal new buildings and improvements are the following with estimated cost in each instance, according to James Frame, city building inspector:

Business Buildings
 Laegler drug store building, with offices and apartments on the second floor, \$60,000; Rosenberg building, stores, offices and apartments, \$70,000; Mrs. D. Donelli, store and apartment, \$12,000; Joe Natti, two stores and apartments (now under way), \$16,000; D. Bartello, enlarged pool hall and barber shop, with apartments above, \$10,000; National Tea Co., two stores, \$30,000 (completed late last year); Frank Fortunato, garage and sales room, remodeled, \$5,000. These are all on Waukegan avenue, or just off that thoroughfare on Highwood avenue.

On Railroad avenue improvements noted are H. O. Burke's oil station, corner Prairie avenue, \$3,000; Brown & Olander building, two stores and apartments, \$20,000; Jack Scarnavacco, store and apartments, \$14,000; Vic Columbi, two stores and apartments, \$25,000; Alex Scarnavacco, two stores and apartments, \$15,000.

On Highwood avenue, west, are the new U. S. government post office building, built by J. J. Flannigan, and an addition to the Shapiro dry-goods store, also built by Mr. Flannigan, the two improvements estimated at \$22,000 in value.

Many New Residences
 In addition to this extensive building improvement program in the business district there have been erected in the past year, according to Mr. Frame, new residences and additions, to the estimated value of about \$300,000.

Considering all these notable improvements within the past year, Highwood has reason to be proud of its progressiveness and the marked improvement in the general appearance of the city.

CITY COUNCIL AND BOARD IN MEETING

The communication from Mr. Ernest Gail with reference to refund on printing was referred to the corporation counsel for an opinion.

The notice from Mr. Hoyt King of his petition to the county court for the annexation of the N¹/₄ of the NE¹/₄ of Section 20, and the SE¹/₄ of the NE¹/₄ of the NE¹/₄ of Section 20-43-12 to the city of Highland Park was ordered placed on file.

Petition Laid on Table
 The petition by property owners and legal voters to disconnect the NE¹/₄ of Section 17-43-12 from the city of Highland Park was ordered land on the table for one week.

Commissioner Reay moved that the following bills be approved and that Mr. Samuel M. Hastings be requested to draw vouchers in payment of same on the Trust fund held by him which is known as the Moroney fund: Highland Park hospital, \$163.35; Roy A. Crossman, \$55.00; Charles Rafferty, \$100.00. The motion prevailed.

Committee Report
 The report of the committee appointed to make an investigation with reference to gasoline pumps in city streets was ordered placed on file.

Commissioner Zimmer moved that the bill of P. Ugolini for the construction of a concrete cement sidewalk on the north side of Lambert Tree avenue Special Sidewalk Tax proceedings No. 170 in the amount of \$1,059.85 be approved and tax voucher drawn in payment of same. The motion prevailed.

The matter of employment of an engineer as recommended by the committee on city manager was discussed and action postponed for two weeks. Upon motion duly seconded, the meeting adjourned.

Board Meeting
 At the meeting of the board the contract for water mains in Highland Park Terrace was awarded to Charles M. Porter Co., whose bid was \$4,520.

Final acceptances were accorded the contract of the West Highland Park water system, water main system in Sunset Woods, Sunset Manor and Hovland's additions and water mains in the Village of the Woods subdivision.

It was decided to advertise for bids for the construction of a system of water mains in Northmoor subdivision.

sande, a hopelessly romantic young lady with a penchant for being kidnapped, is to be taken by Mrs. Paul Perry of Wilmette. Mrs. Perry is a Repertoire Company, and has had extensive experience in stock. She played recently at the Palace theater, Chicago, in "Taxi" a one act play presented by the Playwrights of America. The School of Drama at Carnegie Technical Institute and the American Academy of Fine Arts at New York were Mrs. Perry's training schools, and she brings to "The Romantic Age" rare qualifications for a difficult part.

Melisande's romantic lover who appears in the midst of the whirl of modern life begirt in laces and plumes like a knight out of a fairy book, will be portrayed by James Wetherall of Evanston. This young man made a mark for himself with his admirable work in the Guild last year, after many noteworthy bits of acting at Northwestern University and in the Play shop. His poise, a pleasing voice and stage presence of mind command attention for him in any role he essays.

First Appearance Here
 Miss Jane McClennan of Lake Forest plays the part of Melisande's more worldly cousin, whose phlegmatic temperament is in marked contrast to that of her impulsive relative. This is the first appearance of this popular young debutante in Guild productions, although she has many years of dramatic experience at Dobbs Ferry and other schools as a background.

Other parts in "The Romantic Age" will be taken by L. L. Buchanan, Mrs. E. V. L. Brown, and Malcolm Smith of Winnetka; Moncure Jaynter of Glebeo; and Miss Katherine Hicks. The play is being produced under the direction of David Owen, who begins a long contract with the North Shore Theater Guild with this production.

Four Plays
 There are to be four Guild plays in all during the winter, and a membership entitles the holder to two seats at each performance. Memberships will be available until the first performance opens and can be secured from Mrs. Allan I. Wolf. Highland Park must respond more enthusiastically if they wish to retain the Guild performances in our city.
