Cites Rules

The Princeton dean cites a rule which he believes almost infallible: If a boy is unhappy about his studies in high or preparatory school, he should not be urged or encouraged to continue.

"It will be a kindness to prevent him fom torturing himself further for what will be useless experience for him and an unncessary expense for parents. It sometimes takes not only commmon sense but courage to prevent a boy's doing this, because it is against the custom of the day, but the boy's ultimate education, his mental and moral health, and often his happiness as well, depend upon the decision."
