

CHRISTMAS MAILING SUGGESTIONS GIVEN

SHOP AND MAIL EARLY!

Postmaster Issues Directions to Facilitate Preparation of Gifts for Sending; Read These Carefully

Christmas this year comes on Sunday, and the Highland Park post office will not deliver any mail on Monday, Dec. 26, after 12 o'clock noon.

All parcels must be securely wrapped or packed; use strong paper and heavy twine.

For further special instructions, in addition to the principal directions here given, inquire at the proper window at the post office, or see the postmaster or one of his assistants.

Mailing Directions Umbrellas, canes, golf sticks, should be reinforced their full length by strong strips of wood tightly wrapped and tied to withstand transportation.

Hats: Packed in strong corrugated or fiber boxes. Ordinary pasteboard hat boxes must be crated.

Shoes: Pack in strong boxes, preferably corrugated cardboard. Wrap with strong paper securely tied with heavy twine.

Cut flowers: Place in strong suitable boxes of wood, tin, or heavy corrugated cardboard.

Drawings, paintings, unmounted maps, etc.: Pack or wrap in strong material to avoid damage.

Sharp-pointed or sharp-edged instruments or tools must have points and edges fully guarded to prevent injury to clerks in handling or damage to other mail.

Articles easily broken or crushed must be crated or securely wrapped. Use liberal quantities of excelsior, or like material, in, around, and between the articles and the outside container.

Glassware, fragile toys, crockery must be packed so as to prevent the escape of particles or pieces if broken in transit.

Cigars: Ordinary boxes of cigars wrapped in paper only will not be accepted. Pack in a manner to prevent damage by shock or jar.

Articles likely to spoil within the time reasonably required for transportation and delivery will not be accepted for mailing.

Addresses should be complete, with house number and name of street, post-office box or rural-route number, and typed or plainly written in ink.

A return card should be placed in the upper left corner of every piece of mail. If a tag is used, the address and return card should also be written on the wrapper for use if tag is lost, and a copy of the address should be enclosed inside the parcel.

No parcel may be more than 84 inches in length and girth combined. For delivery locally and in the first, second, and third zones, 70 pounds is the maximum weight; in all other zones, 50 pounds.

Shop and Mail Early During the holiday time the volume of mail increases approximately 200 per cent. It is a physical impossibility to handle this great mass of mail matter efficiently and promptly within a few days.

Patrons sending a quantity of Christmas cards, say 10 or more, should prepare and mail them two or three weeks in advance, as millions are mailed and they can not possibly be handled and delivered if mailed only two or three or four days before Christmas.

Six Seniors of N. U. Team Make Last Appearance on Grid Field Saturday

Six seniors will play their last game for the Purple here Saturday when Northwestern and Iowa meet at Dyche stadium for the final game of the season. These players are Captain Vic Gustafson, halfback; Tiny Lewis, fullback; Daldo Fisher, end; Bus Owens, guard, and Rudy and Al Schuler, tacklers.

Four of these players—Gustafson, Lewis, Fisher and R. Schuler—have played regular ball for the Wildcats during the last three years and rank among the greatest players turned out at Northwestern. They will be greatly missed when Coach Hanley starts building his eleven for next year.

Although they will be lost to football most of the above men will be seen in action in other sports this winter. Fisher is a forward on the basketball team; Lewis is captain of the track team; Rudy Schuler is captain of the wrestling team and Gustafson plays on the baseball nine.

Although badly battered with injuries and bruises the Purple will make a valiant effort to wind up the season Saturday with a win. Iowa's victory over Wisconsin Saturday will make the Hawkeyes a formidable foe and Coach Hanley is busy at work this week in an effort to get his regulars in readiness for the game.

The Purple mentor hopes to be able to start his regular backfield against Iowa if injuries to several of the players permit. In this event it will be the first time since the Ohio game early in the season that the Purple has been able to place its full backfield strength in the game.
