CHRISTMAS MAILING SUGGESTIONS GIVEN

SHOP AND MAIL EARLY!

Postmaster Issues Directions to Facilitate Preparation of Gifts for Sending; Read These Carefully

Christmas this year comes on Sunday, and the Highland Park post office will not deliver any mail on Monday, Dec. 26, after 12 o'clock noon, Postmaster Hugo L. Schneider announces, according to instructions from Washington to all postmasters. It is urged that shopping and mailing be done early to avoid the holiday rush, and in order to facilitate proper mailing the postal authorities have issued instructions to aid patrons.

Wrap Securely All parcels must be securely wrapped or packed; use strong paper and heavy twine. Mails for foreign countries should be sent in November in order to reach destination by Christ-

For further special instructions; in addition to the principal directions here given, inquire at the proper window at the post office, or see the postmaster or one of his assistants. Chief among the instructions issued are the be devoted to the purchase of the fellowing:

Mailing Directions Umbrellas, canes, golf sticks, should

be reinforced their full length by strong strips of wood tightly wrapped and tied to withstand transportation. Hats: Packed in strong corrugated or fiber boxes. Ordinary pasteboard hat boxes must be crated. Ladies' hats and stiff hats easily damaged should be marked "Fragile."

Shoes: Pack in strong boxes, preferably corrugated cardboard. Wrap with strong paper securely tied with heavy twine.

Cut flowers; Place in strong suitable boxes of wood, tin, or heavy corrugated cardboard. Wrap with tissue to retain moisture. Candies: Inclose in strong outside boxes or containers.

Drawings, paintings, unmounted maps, etc.: Pack or wrap in strong material to avoid damage. When not flat, roll around a wooden core and then wrap and tie carefully or place in strong pasteboard tube.

Addresses

Addresses should be complete, with house number and name of street, post-office box or rural-route number, and typed or plainly written in ink. A return card should be placed in the upper left corner of every piece of mail. If a tag is used, the address and return card should also be written on the wrapper for use if tag is lost, and a copy of the address should be inclosed inside the parcel. Postage must be fully prepaid on all mail.

No parcel may be more than 84 inches in length and girth combined. For delivery locally and in the first, second, and third zones, 70 pounds is the maximum weight; in all other zones, 50 pounds.
