Under the supervision of Miss Waterman, who is the nurse for the tuberculosis association, letters with stamps enclosed are being prepared. She reports that 12,000 letters, each containing \$2 worth of Christmas seals will be mailed out Wednesday evening, Thanksgiving eve, to residents of Wankegan, North Chicago, Lake Forest, and Highland Park. As there is no mail service on Thanksgivng, the seals will not be received until Friday, when the seal drive officially opens in this county.
