Interest earnings for the month of October will total approximately \$84,000, or about \$4,000 less than during the month of September.

TO LET CONTRACT FOR FIRST SUPER-HIGHWAY

State Takes Preliminary Step For 40-Foot Road, Chicago to Kankakee

Chief in importance among the letting of state highway contracts on November 30 by the division of highways, department of public works and buildings, will be that of approximately 17 miles of the "super-highway" between Kankakee and Chicago. This highway, when completed, will be forty feet in width, and is designed to care for the heavy auto traffic centering in the Chicago district.

At the same time bids will be received on approximately 45 miles of state highways, 15 bridge sections and one section of grading.

Highways on which bids will be received are located in Franklin, Iroquois, Kankakee, Will, Cook, Adams, Woodford, Massac, Washington, and Perry counties.

Bridge sections are located in Iroquois, Kankakee, Massac, Will, and Washington counties, with the grading sections in Massac county, near Metroplis.
