Inheritance tax in the estate of Charles W. Tucker, Graylake, who died last April, was placed at \$466 in the county court. The entire estate of \$43,312 was left to the daughter of the deceased, Mrs. Vera Dooley, Graylake.

Return on the letters sent out with 200 Christmas Seals, the money from which is to be spent fighting tuberculosis through the county, showed about \$100 for the first day of the \$10,000 drive. Miss Theda Waterman, county nurse, stated that she expected a far heavier response within the course of the next few weeks.

SOAP AND WATER EDUCATION AIDS

CLEANLINESS IS STRESSED

Improvement Shown in Modern Schools As Regards Health Precautions; Children Learn Needs

A log with a student at one end and Mark Hopkins at the other used to be a standard definition of a college, but the small boy or girl struggling to make first acquaintance with reading and writing and arithmetic needs more complete equipment.

Miss Sally Lucas Jean, known to educators and health authorities all over the United States as a pioneer in school health education, and formerly consulting specialist to the U. S. Bureau of Education, points out that even blackboards and globes do not supply the child with adequate tools of learning. He needs milk bottles and wash basins as well.

Embraces Whole Life "The whole life of the child comes within the scope of the modern school," Miss Jean explains. "It is not only his mind, but his body and his emotional life that must be trained. School hygiene has been taught for years, but it is only since 1918 that a nation-wide movement, approved and encouraged by the U. S. Bureau of Education, began to emphasize the positive, cheerful aspects of health education.

"The rules of the health game which thousands of children have learned to play since that time include such routine matters as early sleep, bathing

more than once a week, and brushing the teeth. Many persons wonder why such things can not be left entirely to home training. As a matter of fact, even the most conscientious mothers are glad to have their efforts reinforced by the strength that comes from group enthusiasm. Unless the school shares this responsibility the child may grow up handicapped by the wrong habits of living.

"One of the most practical aspects of this new emphasis on health education is its tie-up between theory and practice. The child learns not only that he ought to wash his hands after play and before meals, but he actually washes them—that is, if the school is equipped for it. Unfortunately only a few schools in this country have really sufficient facilities.

"Go into the basement which in most schools offer the only clean-up equipment, and you will come away wondering how our children are as clean as they are. When a school health program is being planned, be quite sure that an adequate supply of soap, towels, and warm water is made available, together with the well prepared teacher who will interest and train the children in their use."

Right Habits

Washing hands and keeping clean, whether at home or at school, can be made part of a cheerful acceptance of right habits, Miss Jean declares. No wry faces need be made over any rules of the health game, and least of all over such an every-day matter as bathing and washing. Stories of boys and girls in other lands who play the same game, and the examples of athletic heroes, can all be used by the resourceful teacher and by parents, too, to help instill cleanliness as one of the fundamental standards of living.

MANY CITIES SEEK G. O. P. CONVENTION

Interest continues to grow over the meeting of the Republican National Committee which is to be held in Washington December 5th, 6th and 7th. On the 5th, the executive committee will meet to consider Alaska, Wisconsin and certain other problems which were specifically referred to that body. The whole committee will come in on the 6th and remain in session over the 7th.

The contest over the convention city is becoming sharper momentarily. William H. Crocker, the Republican national committeeman of California, who first proposed San Francisco, does not intend to lose anything by default. He arrived in Washington on Thanksgiving Day with National Committeeman Ralph E. Williams of Oregon, and formally opened his campaign on the ground. Clarence C. Hamlin, national committeeman of Colorado, registered some days ahead of them, and N. C. Richards, national committeeman of the State of Washington, paid his respects to the President even earlier. Dr. E. B. Clement of Missouri, Joseph T. Kealing of Indiana, David W. Mulvane of Kansas, and others, have let it be known that they will be in the city in the near future.

Formal applications have been filed by the cities of San Francisco, Seattle, Denver, Omaha, Kansas City, Minneapolis, Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Philadelphia and San Antonio. The selection will be made by a vote of the whole committee.
