NO CHANGE IN LAW ON PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY

No Indication That Any of the State's Having Them Will Alter Law

For all the discussion, it is reasonably plain that there will be no change in the law affecting in any way the seventeen states which have presidential primaries. For the information of the sharps and experts on political affairs, we are again printing the names of those states, and the dates when the Presidential primaries will be held:

New Hampshire, first, on March 6; North Dakota, March 20; Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Ohio, in April; California, Maryland, Indiana, New Jersey, Oregon, South Dakota and West Virginia in May; Florida, June 5.

As to claim that voters do not want to attend primaries, apparently that arises only when they are interested.

The total of all votes cast at direct primaries in 1920 was 8,456,459. Two years later it was 11,567,998. In 1924 it was 12,795,305. Last year it was 13,829,215.
