HEAR OBJECTIONS TO FOX LAKE ASSESSMENT

Much Opposition to Distribution System Is Reported To The Court

Circuit Judge Claire C. Edwards last week started hearing objections on assessments spread on a Fox Lake water distribution system, the estimated cost of the improvement amounting to \$157,000. It is contended by a number of property owners that the assessments are excessive and unreasonable.

The assessments of the objectors who are represented by Corporation Counsel Bulkley, aggregate \$50,000, practically one-third of the estimated cost of the entire project. Corporation Counsel Arthur Bulkley is representing the objecting property owners. R. W. Churchill, village attorney at Fox Lake, is representing the village and is assisted by two members of the Chicago law firm of Langworthy, Stevens, McKeag and Hurley.

The chief objectors are Henry J. Devlin and Felix Boyle. The assessment of Devlin's property amounts to \$13,000 and that of Boyle's \$7,400. They claim no direct benefit in addition to charging the assessments with being excessive and unreasonable.
