ALMA BIGELOW SPEAKS AT WOMAN'S CIVIC CLUB

French windows picturing the surrounding woodland, was a fitting setting for the program of the Woman's Civic club given by Alma Bigelow.

Miss Bigelow is one of the few women of the world who has won distinction in the field of design and interior decoration. She is well-known as the creative artist who designed and executed the beautiful panels in one of the churches at Pontiac, Mich., and at Marquette. She is also interior decorator and designer for the Tobey Furniture company.

Miss Bigelow is one of the artists, whose home is in Ravinia, of whom the community is justly proud. She handled her subject, the "Growth of Interior Decorating, its Weeds and its Flowers," in a fascinating manner, giving the background leading up to the recently recognized art of today, now known as interior decoration. It is a sign of the times, a leveling of class. There is a turning to the single styles such as the early American and French provincial. It has taken time to get people used to paneling and light colors.

"Design counts most in selection," says Miss Bigelow. The decoration of a church is especially fascinating because of the inner meaning to be expressed. The decoration of public buildings has become a specialty for some firms.

"The greatest success in interior decoration is achieved through simplicity with some well chosen, sincere adornment. It will take time and education to bring about a recognition of the fine decoration as opposed to the ignorant."

Miss Bigelow's talk was preceded by a charming group of Swedish songs beautifully sung by Mrs. Edward Christenson, accompanied by Mrs. Harvey Pardee.

FORMER RESIDENT OF HALF DAY IS DEAD

Mrs. Schroeder Passes Away Suddenly on Monday at Home in Waukegan

Mrs. Marie Bertha Schroeder, 51 years old, who until two years ago resided at Half Day, passed away suddenly Monday noon at her home, 1513 Lloyd avenue, Waukegan while she was in the act of preparing the mid-day meal.

She was found lying on the kitchen floor by her son, John, on his return, at noon from school. One burner of the gas range was open and not lighted and gas escaping into the room.

Help was immediately called and a physician summoned but Mrs. Schroeder was dead before the doctor arrived.

The cause of death was not given and an inquest was held at 4:30 Tuesday afternoon to inquire into the case. It is thought that Mrs. Schroeder was seized with a heart attack while in the act of lighting the gas range and while the lungs showed evidence of the inhalation of a quantity of gas, it is probable that the heart seizure was directly responsible for her death.

The funeral services will be held at the Half Day church at two o'clock Thursday afternoon with interment at the Half Day cemetery.

Mrs. Schroeder was the youngest daughter of Charles Voss and until moving to Waukegan two years ago, had spent all of her life in the vicinity of Half Day.

She is survived by her husband Henry A. Schroeder and two sons, Marshall, assistant cashier of the Libertyville Trust and Savings bank at Libertyville and John who lived at home.

MRS. CROSBY SPEAKS AT D. A. R. MEETING

At the last meeting of the North Shore Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution on December 8, Mrs. Crosby of Evanston, who is state chairman for the "Manuals for Immigrants" spoke briefly of the work done by her department.

These manuals are printed by the D. A. R. and distributed by them in quantities to immigrants. They contain such helpful information as a copy and explanation of the Constitution of the United States and an outline of the legislative system together with copies of the flag laws, the American creed and the like.

Mr. Fred Voigt of Chicago gave the address of the afternoon. He spoke authoritatively on the development of the United States Constitution from its inception in 1786 in its revered position as the foundation and guaranty of all joy and blessings which we have enjoyed since.

Its greatest contribution probably was the establishment of a supreme court, an idea then new in the science of government but since adopted by many other nations. The meeting was very delightful and was held at the home of Mrs. F. A. Watkins.

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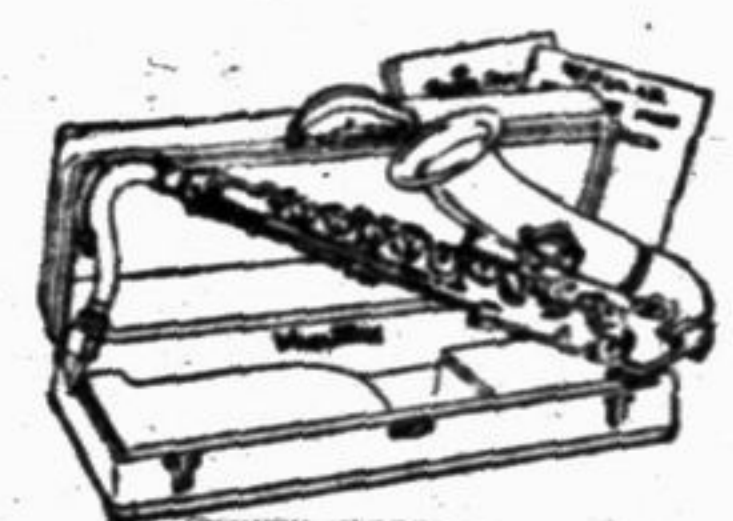


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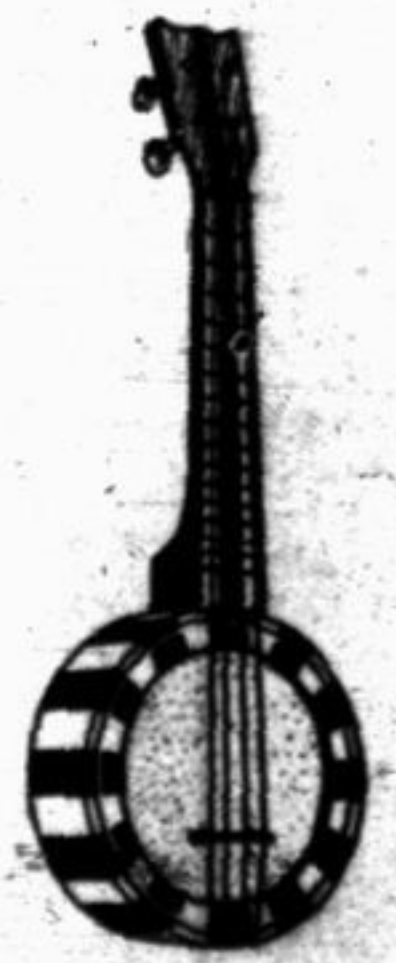
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
