NORTH SHORE LINE TRYING SAFETY GATE

Automatic Device Being Experimented With West of Libertyville

A new type of automatic safety gate has been installed for test purposes by the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railroad—the North Shore line—at Wheeler road crossing west of Libertyville, Ill. Operation during a period of over two months has proved successful, not a single failure having occurred.

Although still in the experimental stage, this safety gate gives promise of solving the old problem of furnishing nearly perfect crossing protection without the risk of the uncertain "human element" and without the prohibitive cost of elaborate automatic gates. It is believed that the North Shore line is the first transportation company to use this particular type of automatic gate in seeking a practical means of reducing grade crossing hazards to a minimum.

The gate arms, which are 10 feet long, extend over the traffic side of each approach to the crossing when set for a passing train. Each arm is equipped with a warning bell and red signal lights, both of which function whenever the arms are lowered. The gate is operated entirely by electricity, through closing of a track circuit by the approaching train. The track circuit can be arranged so that warning can be given by bell and lights at least 35 seconds ahead of a train at the highest speed operated. At present the circuit is completed by approaching trains when 2,200 feet from the crossing.

An outstanding feature of this new automatic gate is the fact that it cannot be destroyed by failure of a vehicle to stop when the arms are down. If the barrier is struck, it swings around parallel to the road and permits passage of the vehicle. Springs located in the gate posts automatically return the arms to the normal position as soon as the vehicle has passed.

For the purpose of accurate tests, the gate has been equipped with a device for automatically recording the time each train passes and whether or not the gate functions. So complete is the automatic equipment of this new crossing safety gate that a signalman needs to make but one trip in 24 hours to change charts and inspect the mechanism.

TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE IN COLLEGIATE RANK

Courses of Study Leading to Degree of Bachelor of Arts Organized

Courses of collegiate grade leading to the bachelor of science degree have recently been organized at Tuskegee Institute, Ala., in agriculture, education, and home economics. They are designed for the training of teachers. Other courses of collegiate grade are a three-year course in nurse training; a two-year course in agriculture, for the training of farmers and demonstration agents; home economics, for teachers and home makers; education, for elementary school teachers; business, to prepare for business positions; and courses in the trades, for manual training teachers.

For several years college courses have been offered at Tuskegee, but except in the department of agriculture they were not organized as degree courses. Entrance requirements are the same for all courses, graduation from a standard four-year high school, with 15 units of work.

ENGLISH COLOR PRINTS GIVEN ART INSTITUTE

The two hundred and twenty splendidly bound volumes containing the English color prints, now on view at the Art Institute, will likely be added to the permanent collections of the museum, as Mrs. James Ward Thorne who has spent several years in collecting them, has signified her intention of presenting them to the Institute. They were printed in England between the years 1800 and 1840. Thirty-eight of them are painted with water colors in what is termed the fore-edge style. This consists of spreading the book open and painting a landscape or a scene on the fore-edges of the pages.

SOCIOLOGY SCHOOL AT FORDHAM COLLEGE

A school of sociology and social service has been established in Fordham university, New York City, under the direction of a dean. The new school is an expansion of the department of sociology of the graduate school. To make it a complete unit several courses have been added, the staff enlarged, and classroom facilities increased.
